

Heppner Trackmen Win Invitational; Rockets Top 'B'

Sparked by Jim Jacobs' school record shot put, the Heppner High Mustangs came away with all the apples Saturday as they dominated their own Heppner Invitational track meet and ultimately won by 12½ points.

The Mustangs racked up 153 tallies, tops in the A-2 division, but they were closely followed by Wahatonga with 142½. Next was Sherman with 113½, and Grant Union trailed with 74.

Pilot Rock won the B division with Umatilla second. Four A-2 schools were in the competition and athletes from 11 B schools placed in the meet. More than 225 took part in the event on the cold day that turned wet in the afternoon.

Jacobs' 47'1" shotput effort, easily topping the field, was not only a new HHS record but actually eclipsed the old mark by more than 18 inches.

In the high jump, sophomore Frank Halvorsen of Ione soared to six feet. This is quite possibly the year's best in the state for small schools.

Actually, though, the Mustang's Dave Hall topped both for all-around effort. He racked up three individual firsts and ran legs on both victorious Heppner relay teams for a whopping 35 points, which easily topped the meet.

Another hometown standout, Bill McLeod, won two individual firsts and two team relay blue ribbons for his 25 points. Hall skinned the high hurdles in 16.5, the low hurdles in 22 seconds, and broad jumped 18'7", while McLeod high jumped to victory and toured the 880 in 2:13.2.

Heppner's 440 relay team, comprised of Jacobs, Hall, McLeod and Tim Smith, won in 48.7 seconds, with Sherman almost two seconds behind. The Mustang mile relay squad (Jacobs, Hall, McLeod and Lennie Hannan) ran a victorious 3:53.2 with Wahatonga close behind.

Tim Smith and Steve Wagenblast added to the Mustangs' tally by each winning his respective event. Smith took the A-2 division 2 mile in 10:51.1 and Wagenblast flipped the discus 138'3" for his first.

Few of the marks posted in the meet could be termed outstanding as compared with other meets, but this, no doubt, was largely due to the cold, rainy weather and poor condition of the track. All events were contested in the separate divisions, A-2 and B.

Among fine showings from other schools were Duane Kandle's 182'10" heave of the javelin for Wheeler County in the B division; Larry Anderson's 23.7 time for Umatilla in the B division 220; Alva Anderson's 46" effort for Arlington in the shotput, B division; and Dave Standley's two hurdle firsts for Pilot Rock, also in the B division.

Coach Cook Tells Of Track Team

As many as six of his Heppner High track squad of 15 members may qualify for the state track meet, Coach Adrian Cook predicted in a talk at the Monday meeting of the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce.

Accompanied by two of his star performers—Jim Jacobs and Tim Smith—Coach Cook told of achievements of his boys for the season thus far, including victory in the A-2 class in the Heppner Invitational Saturday.

In the meet here, 13 boys won 33 ribbons, an outstanding showing, the coach said. After starting with 27 aspirants at the beginning of the season, the number has dwindled to 15 for one reason or another, and six of these are Jaycees.

Jacobs, who broke the shotput record here with a toss of 47'1", is unusual in that he also runs the 100 yard dash in 10.8 to 10.9, the coach said. Seldom does a weight man run the dashes. He also competes in the 440 relay and mile relay.

Smith hasn't been beaten in the two mile yet this season, and he is fairly sure to go to the state meet, Cook said. Smith also runs in the 440 relay and thus has to be a sprinter, too.

Heppner's track team with only 15 members is competing against such schools as Burns, where 35 are participating. Coach Cook pointed out, Heppner High is the smallest of the A-2 schools but is making a fine showing nevertheless.

The coach sees a bright future some two years hence from this year's freshmen. Another outstanding performer on the squad this year is David Hall, hurdler, who last year was second in the state in high hurdles. He expects to reach a peak this year at the time of the district and state meets and hopes to break 15.0. He also broad jumps more than 19 feet.

Also giving top performance is Bill McLeod, a sprinter, 880 man, and high jumper. Coach Cook said that the team needs more depth. "We don't have enough boys and we don't win enough second, third and fourth places," he said.

Jacobs told of the work being done by Heppner High students in recruiting for the blood bank visit and staffing it. He said the sophomores had solicited more than 60 donors.

The Heppner High school golf team won its first match on April 21, defeating Wahatonga of The Dalles. The score of the match was 11½ to 3½. Rust Develops In Cold April; Mildew Feared

April showers favored stripe rust development in Morrow county's 140,000 acre wheat crop, according to Gene Winters, county extension agent. Powdery mildew and a nitrogen lag also developed with prolonged cool and cloudy weather.

Growers experienced serious losses in the early 1960's from stripe rust epidemics. Then about 90 percent of the wheat production was in susceptible varieties. This year nearly 90 percent has been planted to the resistant varieties — Gaines, Moro, Requa, Brevor, Turkey, Idaed, Cheyenne and Nugaines, Wanser and McCall, Moro, McCall and Wanser were selected for stripe rust resistance. Intermediate resistance wheats grown in the area include Burt, Golden and Orford.

Wheat varieties susceptible to stripe rust are Omar, Elgin, Elmar, Columbia, Marfed, Federation, Itana, Baart and Lemhi.

The use of resistant varieties has proved to be the most practical method of control. A number of chemical controls have been tested. The more effective material has not been cleared for use by the federal government. Plant pathologists have estimated that with a severe stripe rust epidemic losses in Gaines wheat could be as high as 20 percent. Losses in Omar, a susceptible variety, could exceed 50%. No losses would be expected in stands of Moro, Wanser, McCall, Brevor and Idaed.

Favorable rust periods are those when the ten day average temperature is between 32 and 80 degrees with rainfall of 2/10 of an inch or more.

Conditions favoring stripe rust also favor powdery mildew. Normal May weather usually controls mildew in wheat. Thick heavily fertilized stands suffer the most.

Cool, damp soil conditions are responsible for some of the yellow appearances in wheat. Warming weather will increase chemical and biological activity in the soil, resulting in more available forms of plant nutrients to the crop. Improvement should be seen on both fertilized and non-fertilized stands.

Agreement Made, District Calls Bids

Having signed a contract with the Army Corps of Engineers for a cash settlement of \$1,484,000 for replacement of Riverside school at Boardman, the county school board Monday night moved towards calling for bids on construction of a new high school there.

Architect Howard Leonard Glazer was directed by the board to reduce the plan and specifications for the building to the point that it could be constructed for approximately \$1,300,000, and asked him to proceed with the bidding documents.

The board authorized calling for bids and fixed the date for bid opening as June 6, 1967, at 2 p.m.

Thus, the long negotiations with the Corps of Engineers was

brought to an end on the school, and the race remains to see what can be done before the Umatilla reservoir rises above the John Day dam. April, 1968, is scheduled as the time for closing the gates on the dam.

In other business at the special board meeting Monday night, the directors accepted the resignation of Carl Lawson, special education teacher at Heppner.

Lawson had requested pay for extra duty, and returned his contract to the board unsigned. Offered contracts for 1967-68 were the following: Darrel Wilson, math and science at Ione High school; Robert Simkins, business education at Heppner High school; Darrel James, band and music at Ione; Elizabeth Bachmof, foreign language at Heppner High school (contingent upon interview).
