Advisory Changes Made

Elected to advisory committee posts in the Morrow county school district were the following: Heppner-Lexington advisory committee—Elden Padberg, Lexington member, 3 year term, 20 votes; Albert Wright, Hardman-Ruggs member, 2 year term, 7 votes; Herman Winter, Heppner member, 3 year term, 95 votes; Hazel Mahoney, Heppner member, 3 year term, 4 votes; Edda Mae Lovgren and Dr. W. H. Wolff, Heppner members, tied at 3 votes each. The outcome of the latter vote is yet to be determined in view of the tie.

One advisory committee—Louis Carlson, 3 year term, 54 votes; Bob Rietmann, 3 year term (second position), 49 votes. Irrigation advisory committee—William H. Parker, 3 year term, 16 votes.

Two of the positions for Heppner members of the Heppner-Lexington advisory committee, those in which Mrs. Mahoney, Mrs. Lovgren and Dr. Wolff polled the most votes, were written, and it was not determined as of Tuesday whether they would accept the positions.

President Wallace McCrae of Blue Mountain College said that he and others connected with the college felt some disappointment Monday night when results first revealed only a 4-3 margin for the college budget. However, after results were learned statewide of other community college budget defeats and many public school budgets also going down, the feeling changed to one of gratification.

The voters apparently were trying to tell the legislature something," he said.

While only about 240 voted in Morrow county, the turnout was some 90 better than in last year's county school election when the top vote getter received 154 votes without opposition. Eye Zoning Amendment

The council moved towards amending the zoning ordinance to simplify procedure to allow building alterations or improvements that would be of benefit to the city at large.

"We want to encourage more building instead of retard it," Mayor W. C. Rosewell said.

One case in point where the council found the procedure to be thwarting is the application by John Lane to build a new metal garage to serve tenants in his apartment building on Willow street. In doing so, he would raze the old garage that is considered an "eyesore" in the downtown district.

However, because it is located in a commercial zone, the ordinance would not permit the new construction with out going through a cumbersome amendment procedure.

Councilmen, Attorney Bob Abrams and members of the planning commission spent considerable time discussing proposed amendments that would permit the council to sanction such building permits.

At issue was the matter of amending procedure to allow conditional uses and variances, and they found it difficult to determine which should be changed. There also was some confusion between the terms "variance" and "non-conforming uses."

One particular stipulation in the ordinance that is creating problems is the requirement to obtain permission of property owners within 500 feet before conditional uses can be granted. In the downtown district, this would include much of the business district and is now believed to be impractical by some of the city officials.

At the end of the discussion, the council referred the matter to Attorney Abrams to work out amendments that would seek to incorporate the changes desired.

Four building applications are held in abeyance without approval because of provisions of the zoning ordinance. Amendment to the ordinance may make it possible for some of these to be granted. Included are the application of Lane to build a new garage at a cost of \$1500, the application of Dick Robison to establish a trailer court on Chase street, that of Emile Groshens to add units to an apartment building and that of Jim Hager to add rooms adjoining a house trailer.

Approved at a recent special council meeting were the following: Cal's Tavern to remodel the Parker building on Main street for cocktail lounge, bar and restaurant, \$3500; Howard Keithley to roof frame building behind his residence, \$150; and to John Lane, to make improvements to his apartment building, \$150.

At the Monday night meeting the council approved these applications: Columbia Basin Electric Co-op, office and warehouse building, West Linden Way, \$166,513; Bill Kenny, 650 W. Sperry, make family room of garage, \$2775; Central Market move offices, \$1000; Mrs. Etta Parker, re-roof part of residence, 280 W. Center, \$144.

Application of Mary Elinor Snow to add a bedroom at residence, 135 S. Chase, \$1000, was approved subject to checking lot lines.

Agreement Approved
Agreement between the city and the Heppner Sanitary Service, operated by Herman Green, was approved. Changes in last year's contract are those that now require cover over loads on truck while it is being driven to the city dump and burning of all paper material in the burner instead of in the open.

A meeting to work on the city budget was set for May 15, and another meeting with the entire budget committee to hear the budget message was tentatively set for May 22. Councilman Harlan McCurdy has been named budget officer.

Mrs. Elaine George, city recorder, said that preliminary work on the budget shows that "it doesn't look too bad" and will apparently be well within the 6% limitation.

Improvement plan with a representative of the highway department.

Because of changes in requirements by the state department, making it necessary to have wider traffic lanes and broader shoulders, the improvement job would now cost an estimated \$37,000 instead of the previously-estimated \$26,000.

Because the new provisions would also require blasting of the rocky hillside, Groshens said that he doubted if the project could be completed now to state requirements for less than \$50,000.

The city had requested state aid on the project and the school district has \$8000 on deposit as its share of the improvement, which leads to Heppner High school.

In view of this development, councilmen suggested that perhaps the city and county can work out an arrangement for improving the extension to bring it to a satisfactory condition without state "help."

Groshens said that the state will lay out a plan that the city may have for review. This would give an estimate of the costs. It would be necessary to purchase some private property for rights of way to meet the new state requirements. However, if the city undertook to do the job by itself or on a cooperative arrangement with the county, the state requirements would not have to be met.

Oppose Bills
Mrs. George told of two bills now before the legislature that she felt were detrimental to the best interests of city governments, and the council passed motions to oppose both propositions.

One would require that any municipal job requiring more than \$5000 in labor would have to be submitted to a private firm or contractor. Thus, if the city wished to undertake a water or sewer project that it might do with its own crew, it could not do the work itself if the labor cost exceeded \$5000.

The second bill would require that a state board would determine standards for city police officers.

Both of these bills, Mrs. George said, have received "do pass" recommendations in the legislature, but each has been opposed by the League of Oregon Cities.

The council received the application of Stuart Dick, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Dick, as lifeguard for the swimming pool this summer. The application was referred to the city service committee. Councilman Jerry Sweeney said that the Red Cross will pay full tuition of \$65 to the water safety course for the lifeguard.

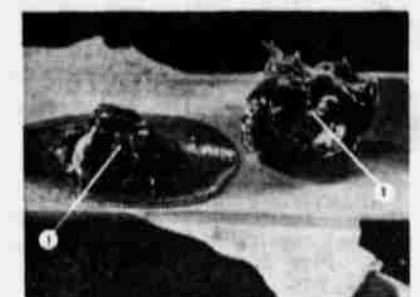
