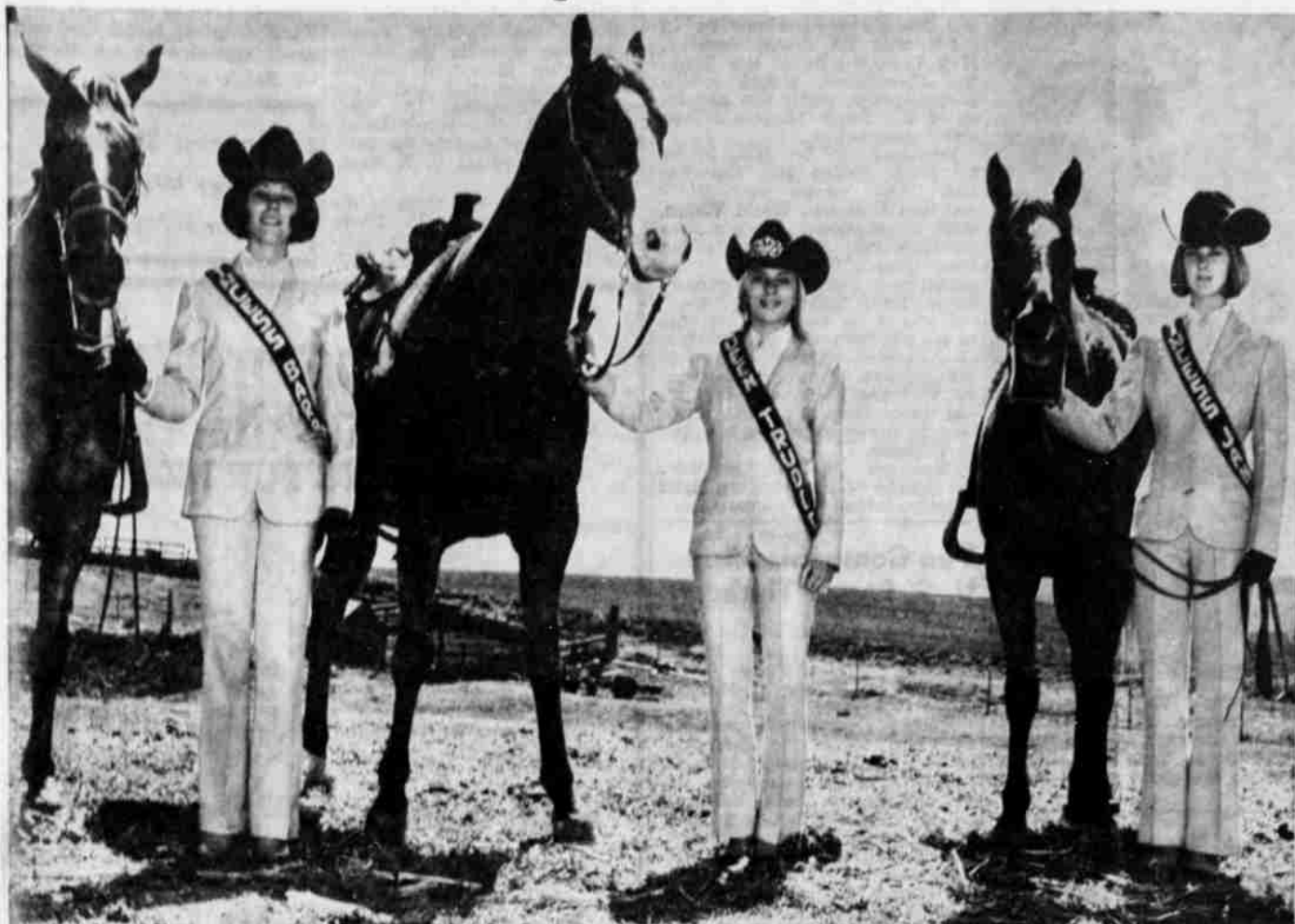


Rodeo Action Due In Arlington

Arlington Rodeo Due on May 6, 7; Parade Saturday

Arlington will kick off the amateur rodeo season Saturday and Sunday, May 6 and 7, with its Northwest Rodeo association-approved show, sponsored by the Arlington Saddle club.

Queen Trudie Brooks of Arlington and two charming princesses, Barbara Gribble of Heppner and Janet Palmateer of Ione, will reign as royal court over the annual event. Princess Barbara is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Gribble of Heppner and Princess Janet is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Palmateer of Ione.

Downtown parade is scheduled at Arlington Saturday, beginning at 10:30 a.m. The Arlington court will ride in the parade, as will the Morrow county Fair and Rodeo court, along with royalty from other communities.

Grand entry at the rodeo is set for 1:15 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday. The royal court will lead the entry.

Dancing will be at the high school gym Saturday night from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. with the Western Gentlemen of Condon furnishing the music. Girls of the court extend an invitation to all to attend the cowboy dance.

Some 200 cowboys and cowgirls will compete at Arlington, making it one of the biggest amateur shows in the Northwest. Points won at Arlington in bareback riding, saddle bronc, calf roping, wild cow milking and bulldogging give cowboys a jump towards the Northwest Rodeo Association championships at the conclusion of the year.

Perhaps one of the most colorful events and still increasing in popularity is the OBRA approved girls' barrel race, which promises many pretty girls in western attire atop some very fast horses.

Combined Group Studies Proposed Plan on City Water

IRRIGON—A special meeting of the combined Irrigon City Council and planning commission was held Wednesday, April 19, in the council room. Its announced purpose was for hearing P.H.A. requirements prior to final grant approval, considering a rental-purchase arrangement on a new loader-backhoe unit, and formation of an operational ordinance for the proposed water system.

P. P. Friezen, district supervisor for Farmers Home Administration, was present to discuss the detailed requirements which the city must meet, before their application can finally be approved. Included in the lengthy list which was presented was the need for an election to approve the necessary revenue bonds which the city would issue in the amount of \$36,000.

Mr. Friezen stressed the fact that these would not be general obligation bonds but rather revenue bonds to be paid off from water system revenue over a 40-year period. The city government must pledge sufficient revenue payment. A bond election will be held in the near future to determine the willingness of residents to approve the issue.

The other items on the agenda received approval for bid call on the equipment and deferment of the operational ordinance to a planning commission meeting the first week of May.
