Ullman Bill Would Roll Back Imports Of Foreign Meats

Congressman Al Ullman has introduced legislation to correct an over-supply of beef from foreign sources which is threatening Oregon's \$100 million beef cattle industry.

"This legislation is designed to slow down the foreign beef which is flooding American markets—and causing deep concern among cattlemen," Ullman said.

Ullman, a member of the tariff-writing Ways and Means Committee which will consider the legislation, said his bill is supported by the American National Cattlemen's Association and the Oregon Cattlemen's Association. Since Ullman was joined by Ways and Means Chairman Wilbur Mills in introducing the bill, early House action is expected.

The 2nd District Congressman's bill revises existing legislation establishing quotas on foreign meat—especially beef—by changing the base period for averaging imports from 1959-63 to 1958-62. The result is a 20% reduction in meat imports allowed.

Ullman's bill also includes under the quota most foreign meat purchased by the Defense Department for use in overseas military operations, and adds lamb and pork products to beef, veal, and goat as meat subject to the quota.
