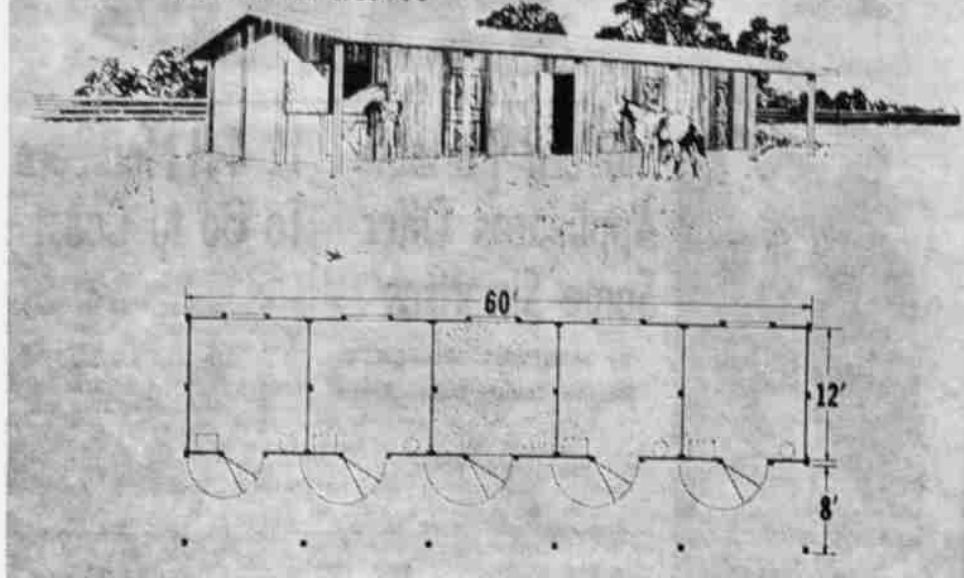


POLE-TYPE BARN
For Saddle Horses

Plan No. 5994



LEAN AND RUGGED—Here's a pole-type barn for saddle horses you can build in separate 12 by 12 foot units to your own desired length. The barn is 60 feet long and 12 feet wide, but if a need for additional stalls arises, the length can be altered. The barn also has an 8-foot roof overhang, sheltering an area for saddling, grooming, and other chores. Rugged pole-frame construction enables the barn to withstand harsh and damaging weather conditions. Squared posts set in concrete piers eliminate the need for foundations and the lateral bracing of walls. Plan No. 5994 may be obtained for 85 cents each from the OSU Farm Building Plan Service, Agricultural Engineering Buildings, Oregon State University, Corvallis 97331.

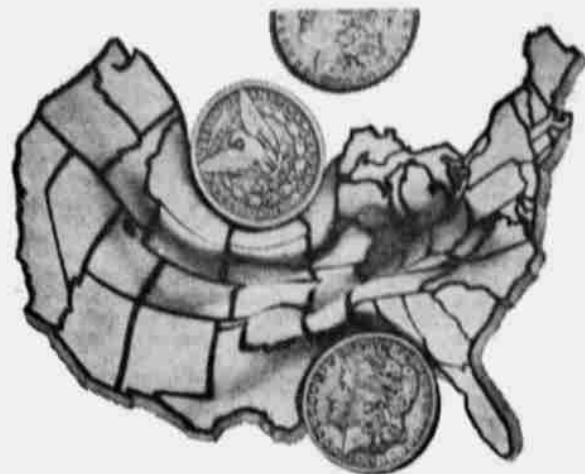
The Ladies Aid Society of Community Church held an all day work meeting at the church Wednesday of last week and made curtains for the Fellowship Room and the Sunday School rooms.

A Financial Squeeze
That Hurts All Over

America's rural electric, which provide our countryside with vital electric power, are caught in a tight financial squeeze.

The demand for electric power is booming. But the money to buy and install the equipment and lines that will be needed to help meet that demand is lacking.

And when 20,000,000 people served by rural electric are caught in a squeeze, the whole nation is pinched.

Within the next 15 years our country will need a total electric power system four times as big as the one we now have. Rural electric cooperatives and other consumer-owned systems, which serve in 2700 of the nation's 3100 counties, will have to invest more than nine billion dollars during the next 15 years to do their part.

To help themselves obtain that capital, rural electric cooperatives have put forward a plan which will permit them to pool their collective credit. They're working to secure passage of necessary legislation by Congress.

Much of our nation's future lies in the countryside. There's room for our swelling population and growing industries. There's space in which to build tomorrow's model communities.

That's why the nation's rural electric must have additional financial resources to insure that there will be ample power to do the job that needs to be done to prepare the countryside for tomorrow's growth.

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
