He gave instruction to 46 enrolled students, 41 of whom were women. People interested in art, many who had never painted, came together as equals, eager to learn the secrets of color under his masterful instruction. They came from wide areas of Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Mr. Enabnit was most complimentary of the Holdens and in their desire to help people develop abilities in art. Speaking of his hosts, he remarked that this was the only art school he knew of in America that believes in teaching just as fast as possible, so that students can get the good out of their training, and become mature artists much more quickly. They are doing a good progressive job of teaching a youngster or retired person to paint in the quickest, fastest possible manner, according to Enabnit. They always invite visitors to stop and see them and become acquainted with what they have to offer in art instruction.

Judge Says BLM Classification Done in County

Classification of Bureau of Land Management lands in north Morrow county has been completed by the bureau and recommendations have been sent to Washington, D. C., County Judge Paul Jones announced at the meeting of the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce at the Nomad Restaurant in Boardman Monday.

If recommendations on the 20,000 acres are approved at the Washington level, they will be returned, published and a public hearing date set to obtain the opinion of the public to the proposed classification, Chester E. Conard of Baker, district manager of BLM, was quoted as saying.

He added that it would be several months before final classification.

Applications for desert entry on the land, made some two years ago, are still on file, awaiting classification of the land.

The matter came up at the Monday meeting when former county judge Oscar Peterson, who had just returned from a trip to Washington, D. C., reported that there had been no action on the classification.

County Judge Jones then said that he had just been informed by telephone that the local recommendations had been made and just sent to Washington.

Action of the BLM will determine whether the lands are to be open for desert entry, or are to be sold to the public, or are to be retained.

Judge Jones also reported to the Chamber on work being done at the legislature. He is a member of the legislative committee of the Association of Oregon Counties and in this capacity attends the current session on one day every two weeks.

He told of the passage of the anti-pollution bill, stating that it was weakened considerably by the time of passage and the gas tax bill, which will still allow 19 per cent to counties although the counties had sought to obtain 20 per cent.

Mrs. Keith Rea of Willows Grange, lone, was winner Monday of the Oregon Grange cotton dress sewing contest on the Pomona level. Judging was done by three accredited judges and Mrs. Rea won both in Class A (adult clothing constructed for someone other than self). There were no entries in Class C (clothing for youth).

Mrs. Rea's garments will compete on May 21 and 22 at the Portland Grange headquarters for the state championship. State winners will then go to compete on a national level.
