Sports Schedule Set for 1967-68; League Changed

Football and basketball schedules for Heppner High school for the 1967-68 school year have been released by Bob Clough, athletic director.

Under the new A-2 district setup in basketball, Pilot Rock will be added to the league opponents. Heppner will play in the western sub-district that will include Wahntonka, Madras, Sherman and Pilot Rock, while Burns, Grant Union and Enterprise will join Vale in the eastern sub-district.

The Mustangs have pre-season games scheduled with Grant Union, Burns and Enterprise, all former league opponents, as well as with Condon, DeSales and Ione.

In football, Pilot Rock will not be a league opponent, but the Mustangs will have league games with Burns, Wahntonka, Sherman, Grant Union and Madras.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION ON MAY 31, 1967 IN THE CITY OF HEPPNER, OREGON

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election has been called to be held in the City of Heppner on Wednesday, May 31, 1967. The polling place for said election will be the former Library Room of the City of Heppner on Willow Street in the City of Heppner and the polls will be open from 8 o'clock A.M. until 5 o'clock P.M. Pacific Daylight Saving Time. The election has been called for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters a charter amendment authorizing \$110,000.00 swimming pool bonds to reconstruct the municipal swimming pool as provided in the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED by the common council:

Section 1. That a proposed amendment to the charter of the City of Heppner be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Heppner, Morrow County, Oregon, for their adoption or rejection and a special municipal election be held as herein provided.

Section 2. That the date of the special municipal election when the proposition to authorize the sale of \$110,000.00 general obligation bonds shall be submitted to the voters is the 31st day of May, 1967, and that the polling place be and hereby is designated as the former Library Room of the City of Heppner City Hall on Willow Street of said city and the polls for the receipt of ballots shall be opened at the hour of 8:00 o'clock A.M. Pacific Daylight Time and closed at the hour of 5:00 o'clock P.M. Pacific Daylight Time, on said date.

Section 3. That the following qualified persons are hereby appointed judges and clerks of said election, to-wit:

Nina Snyder, Clerk

Section 4. That the recorder be and she is hereby instructed to publish notice of said election and of said proposed charter amendment in the Heppner Gazette Times, a newspaper published in the City of Heppner, once a week for two successive weeks, the first publication thereof to be more than 15 days prior to the election. The recorder shall also post notices of election in at least six public and conspicuous places in the city at least 10 days prior to said election which posted notice shall state the time, place and purposes of the election but need not contain the full amendment.

Section 5. That the proposed charter amendment referred to the City of Heppner by the common council be as follows:

AN ACT

To amend the charter of the City of Heppner, Oregon, by adding thereto Article VI authorizing reconstruction of the swimming pool for the City of Heppner; and the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$110,000.00 to provide funds therefor. Be it enacted by the people of the City of Heppner, Oregon, that the charter of said city be amended by adding thereto Article VI to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI

(a) The common council of the City of Heppner, Morrow County, Oregon, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to issue and sell general obligation, negotiable coupon bonds of said city in a sum or sums not to exceed \$110,000.00. Said bonds are to be used for the purpose of making improvements, reconstruction, betterment and repairs to the municipal swimming pool. Said bonds are to be in denominations of \$1,000.00 duly signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the city recorder, whereby the City of Heppner promises to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity thereof the sum therein stated in lawful money of the United States of America, with interest thereon in like lawful money at a rate not to exceed 6% per annum payable semi-annually, each of said bonds to be a General Obligation of the City of Heppner, and to be dated at a convenient time to be fixed by the common council to mature serially, as determined by the council, provided that the date of maturity shall not in any event exceed 20 years from the date of issue. The principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable at the office of the treasurer in the City of Heppner, and said bonds shall be known as "City of Heppner Swimming Pool Bonds - 1967" and shall be advertised and sold as provided by the laws of the State of Oregon.

(b) That the debt limitations contained in the charter of the City of Heppner shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized nor shall any other provision and limitation of said charter apply.

(c) Council shall each year at the time of making the annual tax levy for city purposes, include such levy and sums sufficient to be used jointly with other funds as may be received from operating revenues to pay the interest due on the outstanding bonds of this issue and to retire the principal thereof at maturity.

Section 6. That the proposed charter amendment here referred to the people of the City of Heppner by the common council shall be balloted upon at said time and place under ballot title fixed by the council by this resolution, as follows:

To amend the charter of the City of Heppner by adding Article VI thereto authorizing the issuance and sale of not to exceed \$110,000.00 general obligation bonds bearing not to exceed 6% interest per annum, for the purpose of acquiring funds for the reconstruction of the municipal swimming pool. Said bonds shall be payable by general taxation and by revenues of the municipal pool.

Section 7. It is necessary for the peace, health and safety of the city that the election herein provided shall be held at as early a date as possible and in order so to do this resolution

take effect immediately, now, therefore.

An emergency is hereby declared to exist and this resolution shall go into force and effect upon its adoption and approval. Adopted by the council this 1st day of May, 1967, by the following vote:
