Irrigon Council Hears Proposals For City Budget

IRRIGON—The budget for the fiscal year 1967-68 for the City of Irrigon was adopted for the amount of \$10,496.00, of which \$3,915.00 is in the State Street fund. Being within the 6% limitation, no election was necessary.

The public hearing for the regular council meeting drew no one outside the budget committee for protest or comment.

Also presented was a supplemental budget for 1967-68 to cover the cost of construction of a proposed basic water system for the city. This supplemental budget is based on an anticipated loan and grant from Farmers Home Administration Final hearing and adoption is scheduled for after July 1. An election to authorize the council to issue revenue bonds to cover the loan in the amount of \$36,000 will be held soon.

Several machinery representatives were present to deliver bids and attend bid opening on a replacement unit back ho loader for the city. Four firms submitted bids and two had alternates. Apparent low bid was submitted on an alternate by Mountain Machinery Co. of Pendleton on a new A C machine of 1966 model for a difference price of \$6,191.09, including interest and insurance during the 3-year rental purchase period. Contract award decision was deferred to a special meeting May 18 to other study bids submitted by Campbell Fore, Carl Adams, Case, and Preston Ford of Hermiston, Walla Walla, and Pasco respectively.

Mayor Wilson reported that Morrow County had sent equipment over and covered the landfill and that the highway maintenance superintendent and State Board of Health District office had been informed of this by letter. Beinbauer reported trash being dumped in the desert behind his place. The Mayor informed the council that it is every citizen's duty not only to report these incidents but to furnish evidence they may have to convict violators of sanitation laws.
