

# Capt. John Hynd Goes to Penn State

Capt. John W. Hynd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ewing Hynd of Cecil, has reported at Penn State University, College Park, Pa., for two years civil schooling in nuclear physics beginning the first of this month. Capt. Hynd has been serving at Ft. Ord, Calif., since June, 1965, after previously serving at Vietnam.

Mr. and Mrs. Hynd went to Reno, Nev., over Memorial Day to meet their son and his family while they were enroute to State College, Pa. Capt. Hynd's wife is the former Majken Bauer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Bauer of Portland, and they have three daughters.

After two years at Penn State, Capt. Hynd will be assigned to a utilization tour as an instructor at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., where he graduated in June, 1960.

At the U. S. Army Training Center at Fort Ord he served for a year as company commander for basic trainees and for a year at brigade headquarters as S-1 (personnel) and S-3 (training).

Capt. Hynd has had many assignments since his graduation from West Point. He attended Ranger School and Airborne School at Ft. Benning, Ga., in 1960 and took an Artillery Basic course at Ft. Sill, Okla., in 1961.

He was at Ft. Lawton, Wn., with the Air Defense Command as a platoon leader in 1961 and battery executive officer in 1963 at the Nike Missile Site.

In April and May, 1963, he took an M.A.T.A. course at Ft. Bragg, N. C., in preparation for assignment to a military assistance advisory group in South Vietnam. From June until Aug-

ust of the same year he took 12 weeks language training in Vietnamese at the Defense Language Institute, Presidio, Monterey, Calif.

He went overseas and served from August, 1963, until August, 1964, in Vietnam, first as assistant infantry advisor to RVN forces and then for six months in a G-3 air advisory position at Da Nang.

Capt. Hynd won the combat infantryman's badge and the air medal. He was highly commended for his ability to communicate with the Vietnamese people, both in language and in their social traditions.

Returning to the United States in October, 1964, Capt. Hynd took an artillery advanced course at Ft. Sill, Okla., until April, 1965.

Following this with additional training at the U. S. Army Air Defense School at Ft. Bliss, Texas, for two months, after which he went to Ft. Ord.

# Ione Commencement Speaker Delivers Challenging Talk

Speaker for the occasion was Waldo Bowers, assistant director of admissions at Oregon State University. He used as a basis for his talk to the seniors, the class motto, "To the Stars With Difficulties," except that he used the word "problems" instead of "difficulties."

He admonished the class that there was much more to an education than the three "R's" and added his own set of the three "R's" — Restraint, Rights, and Responsibilities. In closing, Bowers suggested to the class another motto, which they might find helpful in future years, "Find a way to do the job, not a reason why you can't."

Berniece Matthews, salutatorian, welcomed the many relatives and friends attending the graduation in her very fine talk. Deniece Matthews delivered the excellent valedictory address.

Her twin sister, Berniece, was awarded the salutatorian trophy and received the \$1,000 Oregon State P.T.A. scholarship; a one year partial fees scholarship, plus a four year partial fees scholarship from the State Scholarship Commission to be used at O.C.E.

Bonnie Jo Hynd was named for the \$75 Lions Club scholarship for an outstanding senior girl and Leon Magill received the \$75 Lions Club award for an outstanding senior boy.

Karen Nelson was the recipient of the Ione P.T.A. \$75 scholarship.

A Blue Mountain Community College full tuition scholarship was presented to Virgil Morgan. He also received a Federal Government Opportunity Grant of an equal amount.

Patrick McElligott received the \$100 Elks scholarship, which was presented by Claude Graham, exalted ruler of B.P.O.E. No. 358, Heppner.
