A warning to Heppner area business men was issued today by Dale Slusher, local manager for Pacific Northwest Bell.

Slusher urged businessmen not to confuse solicitations for advertising in a California firm's "Classified Business Directory" with billing for Yellow Pages advertising in the Heppner telephone directory.

"The solicitation form looks somewhat similar to a telephone bill and has led some to believe they are being billed for Yellow Pages advertising," Slusher said.

The Classified Business Directory company in California is in no way associated with Pacific Northwest Bell.

Yellow Pages advertising charges are usually shown as a part of the regular monthly billing for telephone service.

Slusher urged anyone with questions about Yellow Pages advertising bills to call the phone company business office.
