**200 Drownings In Reservoirs Disturbs Corps**

Lt. Gen William Cassidy, Chief of Army Engineers, is disturbed by the report of 200 drownings at Corps operated reservoirs in the country last year.

While announcing that 193.7-million visitor days were spent by Americans at Corps' water recreation projects throughout the nation during 1966, the Corps' chief expressed himself as appalled at the needless fatalities.

Citing precautionary signs, patrols, and public warnings, the Corps stressed common sense and courtesy as the final means of preventing a rise in the drownings, most of which were individual happenings, and not related to boat collision or accident other than the drowning.

Corps officials said too many swimmers overestimate their strength and ability, and too few boaters observe common-sense caution in handling their craft.

With millions expected at Corps projects during the summer holiday period, the Engineers plead for care and common caution by users of water-oriented recreation areas, with particular vigilance where small children come into contact with bodies of water in circumstances in which they have no previous experience.

Noting that Corps project drownings are still under the average of private bodies of water, percentage wise, General Cassidy emphasized that water safety is as essential as driving safety, and is principally a matter of special precaution because children are directly involved.

Use of Corps water-recreation facilities rose 25 percent in 1966 over the previous year.
