The congressman predicted that legislation to curb beef imports will be passed by both houses of Congress this year, and he praised the association on its national marketing program and other efforts on behalf of the cattle industry of Oregon.

Cattlemen Hear Ullman's Pledge Against Imports

Congressman Al Ullman of Oregon's Second District, pledged his "100% support to reduce beef imports through legislation this year" to officers and directors of the 2500 member Oregon Cattlemen's association during a meeting in Bend. The Baker lawmaker was the second member of the Oregon Congressional delegation to give the Oregon Cattlemen's Association such assurance. A similar pledge was given to cattlemen three weeks ago in Portland by Senator Wayne Morse.

In his dinner meeting remarks to the cattlemen, Ullman predicted that committee hearings on beef import legislation would begin within the next six weeks and added "we have an excellent chance of getting this legislation passed". The legislation is aimed specifically at curbing the import of cheap beef from Australia and New Zealand. It would revise downward import quotas established in legislation by Congress three years ago.

The Congressman also praised the cattlemen for their self imposed program of production and marketing practices which would result in a more stable livestock industry nationally and a better quality consumer beef product. The Washington lawmaker told the cattle industry leaders that he would "lend his support to this worthwhile National Marketing Program". Key aims of the program were outlined in detail to the Congressman by Larry Williams, OCA President; Denny Jones, First Vice-President and D. O. Hyde, President, Klamath County Cattlemen's Association.

Ullman also had words of praise for Jim Brooks, Chairman of the Oregon Beef Council regarding the Council's various programs to increase beef consumption to the consumer. The Congressman said more states should follow Oregon's lead regarding beef promotion and the hard working, dedicated efforts of the state's cattlemen. He said their work is now beginning to show up in Washington.

More than 100 of Oregon's beef industry leaders went away from the Bend dinner meeting feeling a little better about the industry's problems and the attention they will receive in Washington.

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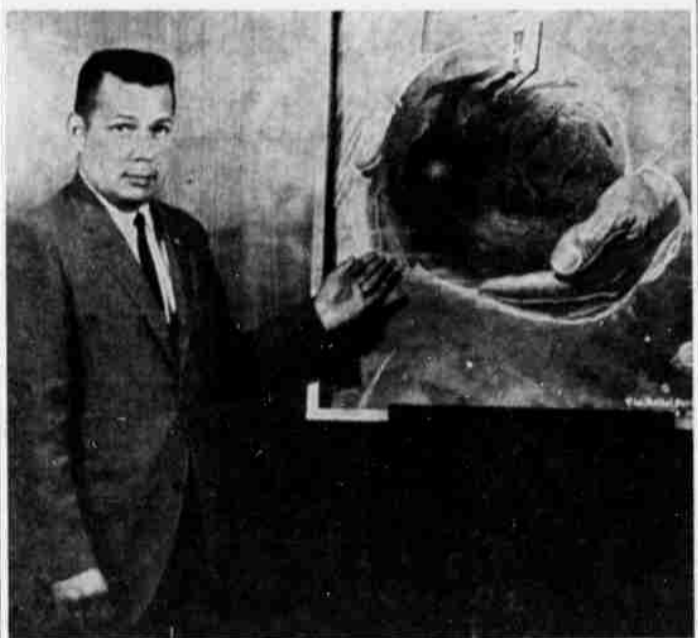
Vacation in South

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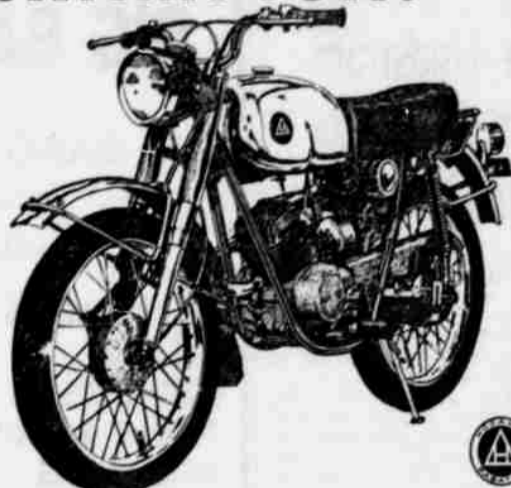
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
