Women's Missionary Circle Sponsors Help To Boy in Taiwan

Efforts of the Vesper Circle, missionary group of the Christian Women's Fellowship of the Heppner and Lexington Christian churches, to help an underprivileged child in another country were recently realized through the Christian Children's Fund of Richmond, Va.

In answer to their application, they were informed that they will help sponsor a little 9-year-old boy, Hsu Chia-Chieh, in Taipei, Taiwan, China. They now have received two letters of correspondence, both his original letters and their translations, which help acquaint the group with him and his family, and their needs.

The following is the personal history of Hsu Chia-Chieh, direct from Taiwan: "Hsu Chia-Chieh's parents were miserably poor, and to make matters worse, the father, a hard-working man, became very ill and eventually died. The mother had a dreadful time in her vain efforts to keep her family from starving. She did what she could to find work, but only the most menial tasks were available and her wages but a pittance. She was finally compelled to try to find outside help for the lad. When we learned of the youngster's critical plight, we were glad that we could relieve it by supporting him through your help. Your kindness will mean so much in his young life."

Due to postal regulations, the missionary group will not be able to send him packages. But a gift of \$5 from them, sent through the Christian Children's Fund, helped make his birthday, June 26, a much happier one for both him and his family. By local standards of value, it was spread very far.

In his letter, accounting for the \$5 gift, he says, "my mother took me downtown to buy a pair of shoes, a blue bookcase and a pair of summer school uniform. Besides, mother also bought each one of my younger brothers and my older sister a suit of clothes. They are all very happy, as well as I, thank you very very much."

According to Mrs. Earle Soward, Vesper Circle secretary, the group is happy to have sponsorship of the little Chinese child, and places it at the top of their list of missionary projects.

Another organization, Beta Omega Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority of Ione, also corresponds and has sponsorship of an 8-year-old Taiwan boy, as one of its philanthropic projects.

Miss Ferguson Spends Summer in Volunteer Peace Work in Mexico

Miss Rosemary Ferguson of Seattle, Wn., granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Ferguson, Heppner, is having an interesting and rewarding summer experience working with the underprivileged people in Mexico.

The daughter of the Ferguson's son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Ferguson, has been a very active honor student during her student days at St. Francis Grade School in Seaburst, and at Holy Names Academy in Seattle. In June she completed a busy freshman year at Fort Wright College in Spokane.

Miss Ferguson left June 14 for Mexico where she will work with the lower class Mexican people through Los Amigos, Inc., the Northwest-West area division of CIASP (Confederation of Inter-American Student Projects), a national organization of college students who spend the summer vacation doing volunteer community development work in Mexico.

She will be stationed at Nochistlan, Oaxaca, Mexico, for the summer. The Los Amigos will finish a road that was started last year to connect one isolated village with the nearest town; they will immunize against diseases for most of the Mexican children have never had protection against any diseases; they will teach English and Spanish literacy in the Mexican schools and help the people form needed co-ops, give child care classes, start a library, work with teen-agers in girls clubs and agricultural clubs.

They will have an opportunity to exchange cultures and help break the "rich imperialist" image which the term American has in the minds of many Mexican people. They hope to show them the value of working together as a community.

At present, the Mexican government will not allow the Peace Corps in their country. The Los Amigos student corps goes as tourists under the auspices of the Catholic church and the village priests assist them in their undertakings. They have trained during the past year by taking Spanish courses, by studying Mexican politics, history, culture and medicine, and by doing community development work in their respective cities. The Amigos have raised their own money for transportation, equipment, and in some cases, living expenses in Mexico.

During high school, Rosemary spent many hours in tutoring. The past year she started a kindergarten, working all year with the underprivileged children between 3 and 6 years of age. Two retired teachers took over the 23-pupil project at the end of May.

With her parents and three younger brothers, the family has visited frequently in Heppner at the Ferguson home. Mr. Ferguson is an engineer for the Boeing Company in Seattle.
