## Legion Convention Stirs Delegates At Eugene Sessions

Support of the true spirit of Americanism was evident in many ways at the annual state American Legion Convention held July 12-15 in Eugene, according to Mrs. Frank Hamlin, delegate of the Heppner Auxiliary Unit who attended the four-day sessions. Guest speakers and general discussions stressed increasing need for dedicated support of the Legion goals.

Mrs. Hamlin was one of about 500 auxiliary women who attended the 49th annual convention at the Lane county fairgrounds. Special auxiliary guests included two past national presidents, Mrs. Hubert Goods of Portland and Mrs. Henry Ahnemiller of Wenatchee, Wash., and also Mrs. Del Burnell of Wapato, Wn., department president.

Auxiliary delegates participated in the presentation of colors with more than 50 flags at the opening sessions Wednesday evening, July 12. Colors from units throughout the states were included in the convention hall display.

Highlight of the July 13 morning sessions was the keynote address by Governor Tom McCall, who appeared before the 800 delegates in support of America's fighting men in Vietnam and "their commander in chief," and paid tribute to Legion programs now in effect in Oregon.

Auxiliary business sessions, which included reports by department officers, credentials committee, reading of rules and resolutions committee, were heard in the Thursday afternoon session. Girls' State Governor Heidi Harrison of the Salem Unit No. 136 was introduced and spoke on the worthwhile project, stating "one week at Girls' State proves what an honor it is to live in the U. S. Significance of the red, white and blue is learned, as well as truth, justice and charity. Girls of all description and creed become acquainted. We find it true that a nation without God will not stand and it will crumble."

Auxiliary delegates were delighted to learn that for the first time in 13 years the Department of Oregon met and exceeded its quota in membership, set for 10,306, by 81 members, making the total membership 10,387. The Heppner unit surpassed its quota of 82, with an increase to 87 members.

State auxiliary officers, elected and installed at the Saturday morning session, included Mrs. Gerald Gower of Cannon Beach, president; Mrs. Keith McDonald of Wasco, first vice president, and Mrs. C. Ray Wilson, Portland, second vice president.

Officers who will serve the Legion for the coming year are John Baether, Kent, Ore., department commander; Larry Antonelli, Portland, and Loren Kuske, Astoria, vice commanders; Larry Reid of Lake Oswego, finance officer; P. M. Blenkinsop of Banks, chaplain, and William Wilkins, La Grande, national executive committee man.

Social activities included a large joint banquet at the Eugene and special breakfasts Friday and Saturday mornings. In state drum and bugle corps competition Friday evening, the Royal Lancers of Portland defended their title against seven competing corps.
