## Red Cross Chapter Seeks Help to Outfit Overseas Gift Bags

Morrow County Chapter of the American Red Cross is participating in this year's "Santa Claus Gift Bag" project for servicemen overseas. Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Paul Heinrichs, 25 gift dittybags are being made and outfitted with items which would be of general use to service men, and delivered to them before Christmas.

The bags are being made by the Rhea Creek Grange women, who are also furnishing a deck of cards and a comb for each bag. Each completed bag will cost on an average of between \$2.50 and \$3.00 to fill each one.

Many of the desired items have been donated, and Mrs. Heinrichs reports that response by Heppner merchants has been excellent.

Deadline for mailing them out has been set for September 1. Contributions of money from individuals or organizations are still needed to purchase remaining items needed in furnishing the gift bags. Those who can contribute are asked to contact Mrs. Heinrichs. Cards with names of contributors will be placed in each bag, and it has been found that service men who receive the bags are generous in their thanks and appreciation, through writing, to their benefactors.

The following is a list of new items which are needed: plastic soap cases, small packages of writing paper with self-seal envelopes, small address books, plastic toothbrush holders, plastic cigarette cases, pocket games (such as can be placed in plastic bags or containers, such as checkers, pinocle, etc.), mailing-size voice tapes (reels of 3" tapes, 150" long), small tins of nuts or candies (vacuum packed), windproof-type cigarette lighters, small plastic snapshot holders, and pocket size shoe polish kits.

Also, any donations of Christmas paper or ribbons will be gratefully accepted, as the appearance and spirit of the gift bags are greatly enhanced if individual items are gift wrapped.

## Teen Needlework Entries Encouraged For Fair Judging

Teen knitters and crocheters are invited to compete for the first time for national honors as art needlework experts in the 1967 National Wool Needlework Contest, now entering its fifth successive year.

The new "Teen Division" has been opened to entrants between the ages of 13 and 19 due to the enthusiastic increase among the younger set of their own knitted and crocheted fashions. The contest was inaugurated by its two sponsors, the National Hand Knitting Yarn Association and the American Wool Council.

The contest will continue to offer classifications for adult needleworkers, also.

Both teens and adults can participate on the initial local level, which is the first step towards competing in the national judging, by submitting their entries for local judging at the Morrow County Fair, which takes place between August 22-25.

In the new Teen classification, entrants will submit sweaters, either knitted or crocheted. The first place blue ribbon winner at the local fair will be eligible to submit her entry at the national level where three Teen winners are chosen for first, second and third places. The first place national winner will receive a three-day trip to New York, accompanied by a parent or guardian, as well as a special cash award.

In addition to the new Teen division, there will be four other classifications, two each for knitting and crocheting in the 1967 National Wool Needlework Contest. These include afghans, knitted and crocheted, and sweaters, knitted and crocheted. In all classifications, there will be first, second and third place awards given at the Fair level, with all first place blue ribbon winners eligible for the national judging. One of the first place winners in all classifications will be judged "Best of Fair" and will receive a special engraved trophy.

All articles submitted for judging must be knitted or crocheted of 100 per cent wool or mohair yarn, purchased in the United States. Entries must have been completed since January 1, 1967, and each entry must carry one label of the yarn used.

National judging will take place in New York in December, with first place winners in the four classifications to receive a three-day trip to New York for two and a cash award of \$1000.
