

McCarty Accepts New Pastorate Call to Othello

Announcement was made last week of the promotion and transfer of the Rev. Don McCarty of the Church of the Nazarene.

Rev. McCarty will leave Heppner to be new pastor of the Othello, Wn., Church of the Nazarene congregation. He will hold his final service at the Heppner Church of the Nazarene on August 27 and will go to Othello the following week. Rev. and Mrs. McCarty have served the church in Heppner for the past two years. They came to Heppner after he finished his college work in California and have both been active in this community. He has served as Juvenile Counselor and as Civil Defense Director for Morrow county.

Othello is in the Northwest District of the Church of the Nazarene, the same district which includes Heppner. They Rev. McCarty and his family hope to remain in touch with Heppner and friends here.

No successor has been named as of this week.

At the present time, it is expected that Dr. Norene will be home from Pendleton by Monday of next week, and Mrs. Norene hopes that the office will be able to provide some veterinary service. Arrangements are being made to have a veterinarian in Heppner part time to assist the Norenes.

O'Gara said that it has been determined that there is a general rise in the economies of the two counties, but unemployment holds at the level of about six per cent.

A total of 350 new jobs opened at the Umatilla Army Depot recently, but the unemployment figure in the counties remains about the same. The work experience program is designed to fill the gap, he said. Many of those seeking employment do not have the qualifications to fill the jobs. Under the work experience program, their salaries are paid through the federal program while they are in training. Then they move into the labor market as trained individuals.

He pointed out that Pioneer Memorial hospital has expressed an on-going need for nursing aides. At the hospital, experienced employees go through a period of two or three months' training at a complete loss to the hospital. Through the work experience program the government would see them through the training period.

Direction of the neighborhood center depends on local needs and the center's board would suggest the direction, O'Gara said.

Judge Paul Jones and Gene Winters are currently serving on the board of directors of the Blue Mountain Economic Council.

The Umatilla County Community Action program was initiated in December of 1965, and in March, 1966, Morrow county court inquired about joining the program, O'Gara said. Two months later, Morrow county became part of the two-county council.

At the next luncheon meeting, Monday, August 7, Rep. Irvin Mann will be the guest speaker. It is expected that he will review important items of the past legislative session, as well as what is expected to come up in the next special session.

Coach Issues Call To Football Team

Coach Ed Hiemstra, who is attending a summer school session in Portland, this week issued first call to aspirants for the 1967 Heppner High football team.

In a letter to the Gazette-Times, he asks that boys interested in turning out for the sport obtain physical examinations prior to August 21.

Uniforms will be issued at the school on August 19 and 20, and first practice will be on Monday, August 21.

"The boys should report with legs in shape, and they should do much running between now and August 21," he said.

While the team lost some excellent players by graduation, including Jim Doherty, Mike Alsop, Jim Jacobs, Rick Johnson, Dennis O'Donnell, Stan Rauch and Nalbro Cox, the coach is looking forward to the coming season with anticipation.

"We should have speed, we should have good passers, we should have good receivers," he said. "With this combination, I plan to have a more pro-oriented offense and open the game more than last season."

"The returning players will have much more experience than last year, and this should be of value. Also, they know what I expect, and I know what to expect, so the early practices will be much more oriented to developing our attack than trying to get to know each other. We can go right to work."

Among those whom the coach expects to have "good years" are Dave Hall, Dean Kindle, Bill McLeod, Pat Kilkenny, Lee Huson, Matt Murray, Steve Munkers, Frank Lovgren, Bob Dobbs, Jon O'Donnell, John McCabe, Steve and Larry Pettyjohn, Alfred Drake, and others.

"Then there are a couple of freshmen whom Tom Hughes and Clint Agee think will crack the varsity," he adds. Adrian Cook again will be assistant coach, and another coach will be chosen to work with the younger members of the squad.

Coach Hiemstra said that it is hoped there will be a large enough turnout so that Heppner High will be able to have a

separate jayvee team, composed of freshmen and inexperienced sophomores and juniors. Bob Clough, athletic director, has arranged an eight game schedule for the Jayvees.

"This is essential if we are to build the varsity to be competitive in the league each year," the coach wrote.

First game for the Mustangs is only a little more than a month away with Enterprise coming here on Friday night, September 8. Three other home games are scheduled. Pilot Rock will be here October 6, Sherman County will play in Heppner on October 13, and Madras will be here in the last game of the regular season on October 27. The Sherman County and Madras games will be league contests.
