## Ruby Fulleton Is 4-H Champion; Many Win Prizes

Rubianne Fulleton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roice Fulleton of Heppner, took both top honors in the Morrow County 4-H Horse Show held at Morrow County Fair and Rodeo grounds on Sunday afternoon, August 13.

Rubianne, riding and showing her horse, Hoolihan, was grand champion 4-H horseman and grand champion 4-H showman for the day.

She raised and trained the nine-year-old gelding from a weanling, and placed in State Fair 4-H horse competition last year with him. This is Ruby's eighth year of participation in 4-H horse projects.

Reserve champion 4-H showman was Patti Healy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Healy. She showed her horse despite the fact that she is only recently recovered from a severely broken leg.

Reserve champion in 4-H horsemanship was Marcia Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Jones. She has competed and placed in many riding events around the northwest.

First and second place winners in the senior, intermediate and junior divisions who competed in the finals for grand champion showman were Ruby Fulleton and Patti Healy, senior; Michelle Miller and Gwen Drake, intermediate; Sherry Kemp and Kerry Coppock, junior.

Riders competing for the grand champion horseman from their divisions were Ruby Fulleton and Marcia Jones, seniors; Becky Fulleton and Michelle Miller, intermediate; Susan Healy and Mary Abrams, junior.

Small fry class in horsemanship was led by Mary Healy with Mary Ann Greenup second, and small fry showmanship class was won by Mary Proctor who won a blue ribbon showing that her performance was up to winning standards even though she had no one to compete against.

This year's 4-H show took place in hot sunny weather before a good crowd gathered in the main grandstand. Judges for the day were Mickey and Percy Reynolds of John Day. They are 4-H club leaders and own and ride their own horses in the John Day area.

Approximately 50 young horsemen, each with his own horse, participated in the show which extended from 1:30 until 8 p.m. Classes were competing without intermission throughout the long show.

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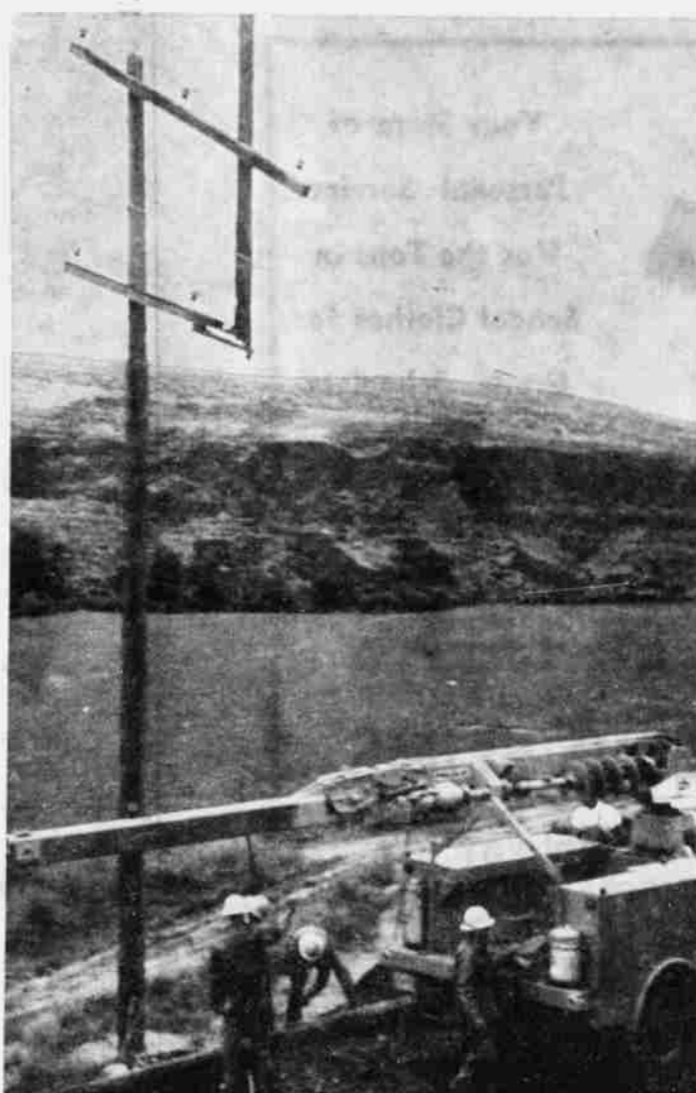
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
