It took grand sweepstakes in the Milton Freewater Pea Festival and at Dayton, Wn. It was first in its division in the Pasco Water Follies on July 15 and has won other honors since.

The float has been entered in nine parades this summer. Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ringhand of Milton-Freewater will bring the float to Heppner. He is publisher of the Milton-Freewater Valley Herald.

The Hermiston Chamber of Commerce will be here with its float, and the Umatilla Army Depot will be back with another fine entry. Condon's Commercial club float will be here.

A novel entry in the parade will be the Belgian show hitch of the La Grande Livestock Commission Co. The big horses in the hitch average one ton each with the heaviest weighing 2350 pounds.

Among the royal courts known to be participating will be the Pendleton Round-Up court, the court of the John Day Rodeo, the Happy Canyon prin-

cesses of Pendleton, the Arlington Saddle club court, the Fossil Rodeo court, and of course, Queen Verona French and Princess Bernice. Matthew Maureen Doherty, Linda Tatone and Rubianne Fullerton of the Morrow county court.

Marching in the parade will be the snappy girls' drill team from Fossil, the lone school band, the Heppner school band, and the Pendleton Junior Drum and Bugle Corps.

The Salem Saddle Club Drill team will be back for the third straight year.

A 1906 race car, owned by Joe Primm of Hermiston, is another entry due to attract considerable attention.

Since no advance entry is required, it is difficult to tell just what floats and entries will be on hand when the parade assembles. It is known, though, that three of the perennial top contenders for honors will have entries again this year — the Mother's club, the Soroptimist club and the Rainbow Girls.

Parade again will assemble on Main street near the library-museum and on west streets running to the west. Officials will direct the entries to their assembling points as they arrive. All taking part are asked to be on hand at least by 9:30 a.m.

Line of march again will be south on Main street to May. It will turn left on May to Court, then go right to the bridge, then turn west there to continue past the swimming pool and back to Main. Mounted groups are urged to continue out the highway to the fairgrounds instead of making the loop back to Main. This will relieve congestion both in the downtown district and at the rodeo grounds.

Reviewing stand again will be at the corner of Main and Willow streets where Harold Erwin, who has been associated with rodeo here for many years, and Gary Van Blokland will be announcers. Sound system will be furnished again by Fred Mankin.

The juvenile float division is for youth groups and is not to be confused with the children's float division, which is for youngsters of elementary age, Peterson said. Prizes are offered in each division.

TRAFFIC TUNE UP

(This is the fifth in a series of 13 articles to test your knowledge of Oregon's traffic laws and safe driving practices.)

1. If you are involved in an automobile accident, what information should you give to the other driver?

ANSWER: Give to the other driver, his passengers or any injured pedestrian, your name, address, and license number of your car. Show your driver's license, and give its number if asked to do so.

2. What should you do if you collide with an unattended vehicle and the owner cannot be located?

ANSWER: Leave a note when he returns to his car. The note must include your name and address and a brief description of what happened. If you damage property other than a motor vehicle (including domestic animals), you must try to locate the owner or person in charge to report damage.

3. You are involved in an accident. A police officer arrives at the scene and gathers information to make a report. Should you also report the accident?

ANSWER: Yes. Reports must be filed by drivers even if a police officer is at the scene. Accident information is confidential and cannot be used as evidence in any ensuing court action; however, it may be revealed whether drivers filed reports. Your report must be filed within 24 hours to local police or the Department of Motor Vehicles.
