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in inaccessible country and had to be battled from the air. A number of other fires started in the area at the same time.

This fire broke out Sunday from lightning about the same time as the School Marm Springs fire near The Dalles. The latter blaze spread quickly and eventually covered some 7,000 acres. It destroyed the home of Mrs. John Denslinger, mother of Mrs. Orville Cutsforth in Heppner. She saved only her purse and clothes she was wearing. The Cutsforths currently are on an antelope hunting trip and it is not known whether they are aware of the fire occurred. Mrs. Denslinger is now staying with a son at his place in The Dalles.

Mr. and Mrs. Al Martin of Heppner were at Cloud Cap Inn near Mt. Hood for the weekend. When the fire broke out they watched it grow from 10 acres to several thousand acres within a short time.

A special archery hunt that would have included lands held by Kinzua was called off because of the fire hazard. Nistad said.

Ranger Miller said that the Heppner district is still without a man-caused fire, and both he and Nistad praised the public for the cooperation being given.

On Monday, 70 percent chance of lightning was reported, but it apparently bypassed this area, and that threat passed. Miller said a weak storm front was reported moving in as of Tuesday night.

There has been some conjecture that if the current dry spell continues, U. S. Forests might be closed to the public. If this is done, Miller said, it would be the first time within his memory.

Sealed proposals for the construction of an elevated steel water tank addressed to the Mayor and City Council, Boardman, Oregon, will be received at the office of the City Recorder, City Hall, Boardman, Oregon, until 2:00 p.m., Pacific Daylight Time, on the 21st day of September 1967, and then will be publicly opened and read.

The work contemplated consists of construction of a 125,000 gallon elevated steel water tank with associated piping and appurtenances, including the footings and a security fence. The connecting pipelines will be approximately 230 feet of cast iron pipe.
