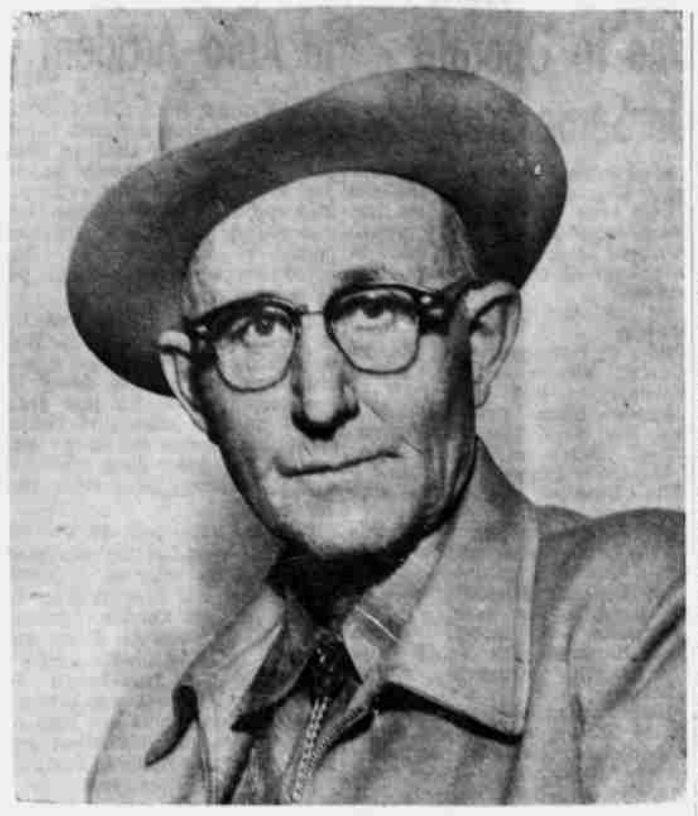

# Frank Weatherford, Ex-Legislator, Dies Following Short Illness

Frank Weatherford, 70, of Olex, who was representative in the Oregon legislature from the 28th district for two terms, died at the Veterans' Hospital in Vancouver, Wash., Saturday, August 26, after a short illness.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, August 30, at 2 p.m. in the Nazarene church in Arlington with interment following in the family plot of the Arlington cemetery. Albee Mortuary of Condon had charge of arrangements.

The prominent Gilliam county resident was born September 3, 1896, on Shuter Flat. His parents were Marion Earl Weatherford and Minnie Spell Weatherford.

He received his education in the Olex and Arlington schools and at Linfield Academy, as it was then known, in McMinnville. Weatherford was a member of the first basketball team in Arlington.

On November 2, 1920, he was united in marriage to Daisy M. Luby at her home in Arlington. They farmed in the Shuter Flat area until 1926 when he opened a barber shop in the old Arlington Hotel.

In 1932 the Weatherfords moved to Olex where he became engaged in cattle raising. He also owned another cattle ranch near Kimberly. Weatherford pioneered a program of putting steers on a full self feed of wheat, which, prior to that time, had been thought impossible.

In the legislature from January, 1959, until the end of 1962, Rep. Weatherford represented the 28th district (Morrow, Gilliam, Wheeler, Sherman, Umatilla counties). During the two 2-year terms, he was instrumental in getting several important bills passed. He was responsible for the creation of an emergency fund collected on stampage and was the father of a bill that brought about the creation of the fire patrol tax relief. Another law for which he was responsible was that to permit carrying an injured person by private vehicle from an inaccessible area to a point that could be reached by ambulance. It was illegal to transport an injured person by private vehicle before the passage of this bill.

Following his service in the legislature, Weatherford became Gilliam county commissioner and was serving his third term at the time of his death.

With the exception of a few years when he lived in Grant county as a young man, most of his life was spent in Gilliam county. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Daisy Weatherford of Olex; one son, Earl Weatherford of Olex; one daughter, Mrs. Barbara Buce of Des Moines, Wash.; three brothers, H. R. (Kek) Weatherford of Enterprise, Marion T. Weatherford of Arlington, and W. W. (Bill) Weatherford of Heppner; three sisters, Barbara Atheran, Sedro-Wooley, Wash., Edythe Newell, Fairbanks, Alaska; and nine grandchildren. A daughter, Gayle Helton, preceded her father in death.

Weatherford was a veteran of World War I, a member of the American Legion, and a member of the Nazarene church in Arlington.

Honorary pallbearers at the funeral service were James O. Burns, Clarence Potter, McKinley Crum, Lester Wilkins, W. W. Parrish and Sid Seale. Active pallbearers were Bob Eaton, Bud Gibson, Elton Anderson, Louis Rucker, Dick Reed and Tom Sumner.

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## TRAFFIC TUNE UP

(This is the sixth in a series of 13 articles to test your knowledge of Oregon's traffic laws and safe driving practices.)

1. When approaching an intersection, which way should you look first?  
ANSWER: Look first to the left to make sure cross traffic is yielding the right of way, then look right. Before entering the intersection, check again for unusual or unexpected action on either side.
2. At night you should lower your headlight beam when you are following another car within how many feet?  
ANSWER: Within 350 feet. The law also states that you must dim your headlight beam when an oncoming car approaches within 500 feet anytime lights are being used.
3. How many persons may legally ride in the front seat of a moving vehicle?  
ANSWER: The law does not specify the exact number of people that may legally ride in the front seat of a moving vehicle. However, no load, or no seating of passengers is legal if it obstructs the driver's normal view, or interferes with his driving.
4. How many feet behind fire apparatus must a driver follow?  
ANSWER: 500 feet. Also do not park within two blocks of any fire truck answering a fire alarm, and do not park within three blocks of a fire.
