## Wheat Meeting Slated Tuesday

Robert Jepsen, Ione, president of the Oregon Wheat Growers League, announces that the quarterly meeting of the league's executive committee will be held in the Arlington city hall, Tuesday, September 5, at 9:30 a.m.

A full agenda is planned which will include a thorough discussion on freight rates in the Pacific Northwest. Another topic of importance will be a review of the bills that passed the last legislative session, especially those that affect wheat producers. Discussion will also be held on bills that will be introduced at the special session that will concern our wheat producers.

Garth Rouse of the Oregon Farm Bureau will discuss their workman's compensation proposal. All farmers in the state who have an annual payroll of \$1,500 or more will come under the law January 1, 1968. At that time, they must carry either private or state compensation and this is of special interest to many wheat producers.

Other major topics will be a review of Western Wheat activities, a program to develop more market information for producers, grain standards, feed grain research and others.

President Jepsen urges any interested wheat producer to attend as this meeting is not limited to the executive committee.

Zentner started in the musical field by winning a Philharmonic Guggenheim Foundation Scholarship after playing the trombone for only six months. In the 1940's, Zentner was playing with orchestras such as those of Les Brown, Harry James, and Jimmy Dorsey. He formed his own band in the 1950's and has been a band-leader since. Voted the "band of the year" on several occasions, Zentner's group has been named by a national magazine as the Band of 1967.

Morrison said arrangements are being made to have a modern group play during the intermission periods each night to satisfy the musical tastes of the younger set; however, he emphasized that Zentner plays all kinds of music, including rock and roll.
