

Punt, Pass, Kick Contest Planned By Ford and Lions

Annual Punt, Pass and Kick contest for boys of ages 8 through 13 is planned again under the joint sponsorship of Heppner Auto Sales, Inc. and the Lions club, Everett Keithley of Heppner Auto announces.

Registration is open now for the contest, which will be held on Saturday, October 7, at the rodeo grounds in Heppner. Boys who wish to compete may register until October 6. Those in the lone area are invited to register at Bristow's Market, and those in Heppner or areas closer to Heppner are invited to register at Heppner Auto Sales.

Parents are asked to accompany the boys when they register.

A book of tips on passing and kicking will be given to each registrant as well as a PP&K lapel pin.

Lindsay Kincaid is working through the Lions club as chairman of the contest for the lone area and Joe Balfie, also of the Lions, is chairman for the Heppner area. Keithley is general chairman.

Separate clinics, to help teach the boys the fundamentals of kicking and passing, are scheduled for lone and Heppner on Saturday, September 23, Keithley said.

Boys who compete are eligible for prizes, three being offered for each year of age, or 18 in all. Prize winners in the contest here will have their points matched with those competing in other areas. National winners will earn the right for a trip to Washington, D. C., accompanied by parents, and to the National Football league playoff game.

The national PP&K event is sponsored by the Ford Motor Company, and Earl Ayres of Heppner Auto Sales has sponsored the contest locally for several years. Some of the boys who took part a few years ago are now mainstays on the high school football teams.

Sonja Goodrow received second place award for junior sheep showman, and a second place for her ewe lamb. For having the outstanding record book, she won \$5 and Mrs. Ray Rogers' record book award.

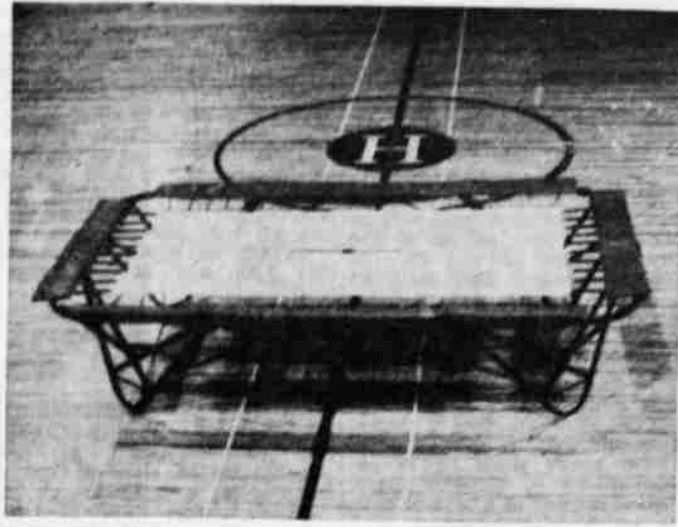

The organization has 10 directors, or co-chairmen. A report on the projects for the 1966-67 year was given. The Booster Club donated \$125.00 towards the purchase of a trampoline and safety pads to be used by both the Heppner grade school and Heppner High school physical education classes. Also, \$25.00 was donated to each the Heppner Grade school and Heppner High school for the purchase of library books.

Through the efforts of the Booster Club, C. E. McQuarrie and Forrest Burkenbine, and through the courtesy of the Pepsi Cola Company, a new scoreboard has been made available for football and baseball seasons.

A membership drive will soon be underway upon receipt of the 1967-68 renewal stickers. Membership dues are \$2.00 per year per person and all interested persons are welcome to join and urged to attend the meetings.

Rineharts to Attend Seattle Convention

State of Oregon Vehicle Sale Set

State of Oregon will hold its eighth annual vehicle sale of used cars and trucks at Pendleton, Saturday, September 16. The sale will commence at 10 a.m. on the parking lot of the Pendleton State Office Building, 700 S. E. Emigrant at 7th, and will consist of 32 units, including 21 sedans, one station wagon, five pickups, two dump trucks and three suburban cars. One four wheel drive pickup and dump truck is among them. Many of these vehicles are low mileage, with less than 56,000 miles. Five Smith & Wesson .38 caliber revolvers and a portable steam cleaner will also be offered for sale.

Inspection of the vehicles may be made between the hours of 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. September 14 and 15, from 8 a.m. September 16, until sale time. It is anticipated that these vehicles will be sold in approximately one and one-half hours.

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Churches Sponsor Clothing Drive

Churches of the area are combining on a World Service Clothing Drive, which will come to a close on Monday, October 16. This will be the latest pickup date for good, usable clothing that can be sent out and distributed through the Church World Service organization for overseas relief.
