Said bonds shall be in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest to be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Heppner, Oregon. Said bonds shall be dated October 1, 1967, and will mature serially as follows:

All bonds or any part of this issue maturing on or after January 1, 1978, shall be subject to call and redemption in direct serial number order at the option of the City of Heppner on any interest paying date on or after January 1, 1978.

Said bonds shall be sold to the highest responsible bidder for not less than ninety-eight percent (98%) of their par value and the entire amount of accrued interest thereon, and to the bidder offering the lowest effective rate to the City of Heppner, taking into consideration and account such premiums as are offered or discounts offered and such items of cost as have been or shall be charged by the bidder in connection with the purchase and delivery of said bonds, with interest being computed to the respective maturity date.

A certified check on a bank doing business in the State of Oregon equal to two percent (2%) of the par value of the said bonds must accompany the bid as evidence of good faith on the part of the bidder. The opinion of Messrs. Shuler, Rankin, Myers & Walsh, Attorneys at Law, Portland, Oregon, shall be deemed sufficient as to the

legality of the issuance and obligation of said bonds. The bid must also contain notice of the total interest cost of the issue under the terms of the bonds. The City of Heppner, Oregon, will make the award of the sale of the bonds at 8:00 o'clock P.M., on October 9, 1967, but reserves the right to reject any and all bids received.

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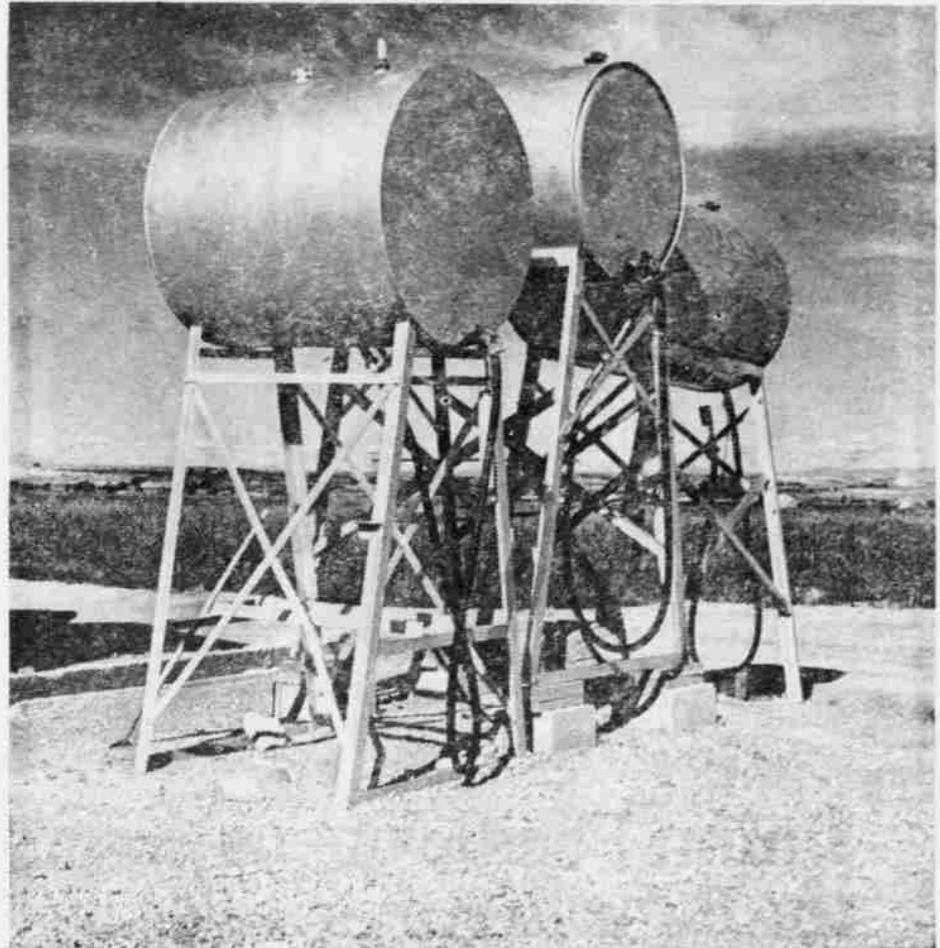

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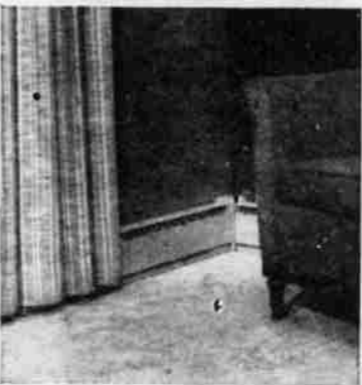

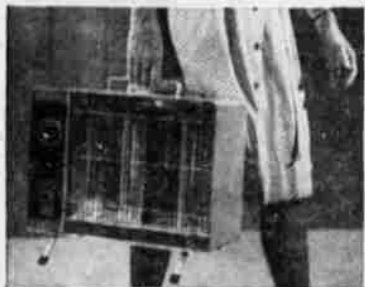
