Pvt. Donald Troxell Trains as Marine

Marine Private Donald D. Troxell Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald D. Troxell Sr. of Spray, completed two weeks of training at Camp Pendleton, Calif., under simulated combat conditions in the fundamentals of day and night, patrolling, employment of infantry weapons, survival methods and assault tactics at this Marine Corps base.

This individual combat training is given every Marine after his graduation from recruit training. Taught by combat experienced non-commissioned officers of the infantry training regiment here, it prepares the young Leatherneck to become part of the Marine air-ground combat team.

While in the field he was taught how to use hand grenades, a compass and the principles of map reading and land navigation. He learned how to detect and disarm mines and booby traps and, while being exposed to live machine gun fire, he learned to advance safely from one point to another.

From this course, he is scheduled to go on to more advanced training before being assigned to his permanent unit.

## Gridders Edge Condon, 12 to 7

By coming from behind Friday afternoon at Condon, Heppner High's football team won its first game of the season, 12 to 7.

The teams were tied, 0-0, at halftime with neither side able to generate a sustained drive.

In the third quarter, the Mustangs took the opening kickoff and marched downfield to score with David Hall going over on a wide sweep of left end for 20 yards. A pass try for the point, to Bill McLeod, failed. Dean Kindle joined with Hall in picking up most of the yardage on the scoring drive which covered 49 yards after Hall had made a fine runback of the opening kickoff.

He took the ball on a reverse in handling the kickoff, fooled the defenders and went to the Condon 49, where the drive started.

Condon found an opportunity immediately afterwards and made it pay, Heppner's kickoff went barely 10 yards when it rolled off the kicking tee just as Randy Stillman started to boot it.

The Blue Devils connected on some crucial passes and made good yardage through the line as they covered 50 yards. Jamie Grabenhorst passed to Bill Fatland in the end zone for 30 yards and a touchdown. Evan Davis kicked the extra point, and Condon led 7 to 6.

It looked as if this might stand up for the final score, but Heppner recovered a fumble deep in Condon territory. With

Kindle packing the ball on almost every play, the Mustangs scored the winning touchdown. Kindle made the points as he cracked over from the 2-yard stripe. He tried to run the point but was stopped short.

With only four minutes to play, the Blue Devils tried to rally for a winning touchdown march but time ran out before they could reach midfield after Stillman had made a fine kickoff and the Condon ballparker was nailed deep in Blue Devil territory.

"Condon enjoyed too much time to throw in the first three quarters," Coach Ed Hiemstra said in post-game comment. "In the fourth quarter, Matt Murray replaced Lee Huson at defensive end, and from there on, it was all Mustang. They continually dropped the Condon quarterback for losses and finally took over."

The coach said that he was pleased with the progress of his team's tackling. "It was much better than in the first game," he said.

Coach Hiemstra had words of praise for Kindle.

"Besides doing yeoman work on offense, he did an outstanding job as defensive linebacker," he said.

Others who were singled out for special praise were Terry Corbin, veteran tackle, for his overall play; Bill Greenup, for his defensive play; Matt Murray for his good work as defensive end; and Bob Dobbs for his "tremendous improvement."
