

Mustang Gridders Trim Burns 26-19

Dobbs led the Mustangs on defense with eight tackles. Terry Corbin played very well as did sophomore Matt Murray at defensive end. Dean Kindel was again the work horse as he carried 26 times for a total of 115 yards and a fine 4.4 average. Dave Hall's running ability was not wasted by his playing quarterback as he ran for two touchdowns, one a nifty 63-yard punt return and the other an 81-yard kickoff return. On each run, Dave broke a hard tackle to continue his flight to the goal line behind some tremendous blocks from his teammates.

Heppner's pass defense left something to be desired the first two games, but it showed promise against Burns with two interceptions and held the Hillanders to five short completions in 14 tries.

Heppner received the opening kickoff and proceeded to march down the field but became too anxious and suffered some penalties which stalled their drive and they lost the ball on downs. Burns fared poorly as it was blanked in three tries and was forced to punt. Heppner again marched down the field, but Burns stiffened and took over on downs deep in its own territory.

The Hillanders fared no better than the first time and were forced to punt after gaining nothing in three tries. John Hall took the ball on his own 35-yard line and cut to the left. Just as three Hillanders thought they would smear him, he handed off on a reverse to his "big" brother, Dave, and behind a wall of blockers, Dave was off for pay dirt. He was hit hard on the Burns 45, but Dave had other ideas and broke the tackle and continued on to score the first touchdown. Kindel added the extra point with a blast over right tackle and it was Heppner 7, Burns 0.

Bill McLeod, who accidentally showed during the week that he could place kick, kicked off for Heppner (the ball was off during the game, kicking one into the end zone), and Burns fared no better than previously. They resorted to a pass to attempt to gain a crucial first down. McLeod denied them by an interception and ran it back to his own 25. Penalties cropped up again and Heppner was forced to punt. Burns fumbled on the first play and big Bob pounced on it to give the Mustangs another opportunity. This time they were not to be denied and marched in for their second score. Kindel ran it over from the six-yard line. An attempted pass from D. Hall to McLeod for the extra point failed. Heppner now led 13 to 0.

Half Ends 19-7

Burns came to life on the next kickoff, as the Mustangs momentarily let up, and drove the length of the field for their first score with Erwin taking it over. They placed kicked the extra point and with little time remaining in the first half, trail-

ed by only six points. The Hillanders kicked off and "Big" Hall took the ball on his own 19 yard line, cut to the left and after breaking a tackle on his own 45, cut back to the right and behind some good blocking, with Murray wiping out the last man with a vicious block, ran the remaining distance unmo- lested. Kindel's line plunge failed for the extra point. Thus the first half ended with Heppner out in front, 19 to 7.

The second half began with Heppner kicking to Burns and after three futile attempts to gain a first down, Burns was again forced to punt. Heppner took over on its own 25 and put on a sustained drive for its final touchdown with Steve Pettyjohn taking a 10-yard pass from Stillman for the score. Stillman rolled to his right to try a pass for the extra point and upon seeing his receivers covered, tucked the ball and ran it over. Heppner now led 26 to 7.

Burns was in control at the beginning of the fourth quarter and drove down the field with Shelton going the final yard for the score. They attempted a pass for the extra point but Kindel knocked it away, and the score was Heppner 26, Burns 13.

Reserves Relieve Injured
Heppner was penalized on the next series of downs after receiving the kickoff and was forced to punt. The Mustangs were now seriously handicapped through the loss of several starters from temporary injuries. On the sidelines were D. Hall, Stillman, Murray, Pettyjohn, Corbin, and Kindel. Reserves were trying to use up time and keep the drive going. They held Burns and forced them to kick, but on the ensuing downs Heppner tried a pass on a crucial third down. In a backfield mix-up, Bruce Marquardt ended up with the ball and attempted a pass which was wide of its mark and right in the hands of a Burns defender. He was caught on the one yard line, but Shelton took it on in for the score. On the attempted place kick for the extra point, Heppner's fine sophomore end, Lee Huson, broke through to block it. Heppner now led, 26 to 19.

On the next series of plays, Heppner was penalized 15 yards for holding and was forced to punt. Burns tried desperately to score before the time ran out, but "Little" Hall came through with a big interception and the Mustangs ran out the clock.

This was a fine victory for the Mustangs and they are now eyeing a victory over the Wah-tonka Indians at The Dalles Friday night. A victory would place them in a commanding position to gain the league title. The injuries received in the Burns game are healing, with Kindel the only doubtful starter, and if he isn't ready, John

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TRAFFIC TUNE UP

(This is the tenth in a series of 13 articles to test your knowledge of Oregon's traffic laws and safe driving practices).

1. If you were involved in an automobile accident, to whom would you report your insurance coverage?

ANSWER: You should make your report to the Department of Motor Vehicles. Space is provided for this on the official accident report form. Be sure you include the name of your liability insurance company, the policy number, and the name of your insurance agent.

2. If you were convicted of driving while intoxicated, but had no accident, would you be required to provide proof of your financial ability to respond for damage?

ANSWER: Yes. Other serious traffic charges for which you would have to show proof include: three reckless driving charges within 12 months, manslaughter or negligent homicide resulting from operation of a vehicle, fleeing a police officer, failure to stop at accident scenes involving death and injury, and failure to report accidents.

3. If you are hit by an uninsured vehicle, whom should you consult first?

ANSWER: Consult a representative of your insurance company. Do not file a claim against the other driver unless you are reasonably certain that he is uninsured and at fault in the accident.
