Sherman Huskies Due Here Friday For League Game

Sherman High's Huskies invade the Heppner territory Friday night, and the visitors will seek their first league victory from a team which trampled its last foe by a whopping 51-0. The Huskies, looking for their first league win this season, will be fired up to win one this week-end. The contest will be at the rodeo grounds here at 8 p.m.

"The law of averages says they're about due for a win," was Coach Ed Hiemstra's view of the upcoming battle. "They're rough, tough, and big."

The Huskies have dropped both of their first two league counters, the first one to Madras, and the other, last week-end, to Grant Union. The Mustangs have yet to meet these two formidable rivals so comparison is impossible on this basis.

The resounding win over Pilot Rock last Friday gave the Mustangs three wins and two losses for the season. Since the Rockets are not a league foe for Heppner this fall, the Horsemen are still 1-1 in the league, with three more counting games left on their schedule.

In the last meeting of Sherman and Heppner, it was Heppner on top by 21-6. Last year's score means absolutely nothing in this year's game. The Huskies have always been a good, explosive team.

The Mustangs haven't as yet met any team with a lot of size, so the Huskies could be trouble. Hard work is the key to winning and the Mustangs have worked hard again this week. Dean Kindle will be out of action still; it is doubtful whether he will be able to play for quite some time. His thigh is improving but is not yet healed enough so he can join his teammates.

No major injuries were sustained last week and the Horsemen will be ready.

Cards Trip Tigers, 12-6; Prepare for Umapine

Ione High's football team battled its way to a 12-6 lead at the end of the third quarter against Weston on the Cardinals' grid Friday afternoon, and they had to fight like demons the rest of the way to hold the edge.

But hold it they did, and they emerged with their second league victory in as many starts with the 12-6 score standing up to the final gun.

The Tigers roared deep three times in the fourth quarter, going to the one-yard line and to the 23 on the occasions. "We played sloppily between the 20's, but we stiffened from there on," said Coach Gordon Meyers after the contest.

In the matter of ball control, the second half was a reversal of the first two periods. Ione had 39 offensive plays in the first half to Weston's 19, but in the second half, Weston made 39 plays and Ione only 11.

But Ione's winning touchdown came on just three of those 11 plays. With the score knotted at 6-6, Weston took the third quarter kickoff. The Tigers moved on a drive but it stalled on the Ione 30. The Cards then nailed Weston ball packers for losses, eventually taking the pigskin on the Ione 46 when a fourth down try by the Tigers for needed yardage failed.

Three plays later the Redbirds had their second, and winning touchdown. Frank Halvorsen broke into the clear and ran 48 yards to score.

At the start of the game, it appeared that the Redbirds would command the contest. They took the kickoff and punched their way downfield. Starting at the Ione 18, they

took 16 plays to hit paydirt, Halvorsen going in from the one-yard line.

But the Tigers weren't to be underestimated. They came back on the march of their own and reached the Ione 19. There they fumbled and Ione recovered. The Cards attempted a pass and a Tiger grabbed an interception on the 25, racing back to the one. At this point Cecil Ballman ran it over.

Ione was on the march just before halftime when they got to the Tigers' one-yard line with time running out. They tried two hurried plays but failed to dent the end zone before the intermission gun sounded. With their 2-0 league record, the Cards now go against Umapine at Umapine Friday afternoon. Riversiders found Umapine tough and so Coach Meyers is expecting a tough tussle with them. Last league game for Ione will be against Riversiders on the Cardinals' field on Friday, October 20. This has possibilities of being for the division title, and it will also be Ione's homecoming, so it should be a great one.

Mustangs Rout Rockets in Scoring Spree

Friday the 13th came a week early for Pilot Rock High's football team. Their luck ran out Friday, October 6, when they could do nothing right against the Heppner Mustangs on the rodeo grounds here and lost, 51-0.

High school statisticians would have to dig deep to find a more one-sided victory for the Mustangs in the annals of Heppner High. It bettered by 10 points the 41-0 shellacking that the Horsemen administered to Wahntonka here last year.

But there was no indication that Coach Ed Hiemstra and his charges intended to "pour it on." The coach used every man on his thin bench in the game. This was a night when they could do nothing wrong and the

Rockets couldn't muster a point by any maneuver they attempted.

Heppner was on the scoreboard in just two plays after the kickoff. It came on a 53-yard pass play with Dave Hall pitching to Bill McLeod. The speedy end took the perfectly-tossed "bomb" over his shoulder and with a burst of speed outdistanced his lone pursuer to ramble into the end zone. Bruce Marquardt kicked the point, Heppner 7, Pilot Rock 0.

It wasn't long until Heppner had the ball again and Randy Stillman, who was to have a big night, ran it in from the four. The kick try failed. Heppner 13, Pilot Rock 0.

In the early part of the second, John McCabe had his turn.

He broke free and ran 30 yards to score. The kick again was blocked. Heppner 19, Pilot Rock 0.

Dave Hall completed the first half scoring for Heppner on a 10-yard run, and the kick try again was no good. This made the score 25-0 at halftime.

In the third quarter, Stillman broke away around end, hit open country and headed for the end zone, taking off from his own 35. A Rocket defender stuck with him for a while, but Stillman, like McLeod, had the legs to pull away and galloped the distance for six more points. Steve Pettyjohn scored the extra point on a pass from Marquardt. Heppner 32, Pilot Rock 0.

Going into the fourth, McCabe

again tallied for Heppner on a 6-yard run, and the pass try for PAT failed. Heppner 38, Pilot Rock 0.

McLeod grabbed a long pass pitched by Stillman and churned the turf to reach paydirt once more, going 50 yards on the pass and run. The kick try failed. Heppner 44, Pilot Rock 0.

The Rockets, playing against a lineup of reserves, tried to make headway late in the game but found themselves with their backs to the wall. They attempted a pass deep down, but it went awry as the quarterback was rushed, and Lineman John Harris found it coming into his arms. He grabbed an interception, hesitated and then zoomed straight into the end zone from the Rockets' 25. Marquardt kicked the point, and the final tally was 51-0.

Perhaps the early Heppner strikes tended to demoralize the visitors for they never could get a sustained drive going and never seriously threatened to score. But they stuck in the game and kept trying until the bitter end.

This was a non-league game for both teams, since the Rockets play in the eastern division of the Greater Oregon circuit.
