BOARDMAN — Barry Barnes of Cornell, Howland, Hayes & Merryfield of Seattle, Wash., was present at the meeting of the Boardman City Council last Tuesday night to review the bids for the overhead storage tank and for the gasoline engine for the city hall.

Chicago Bridge & Iron Company of Seattle was low bidder for the tank at \$69,470 and \$77,490 with alternates, and will be awarded the contract on approval by the U. S. Corps of Engineers. Instrument Laboratories of Seattle was low bidder for the gasoline engine, but no contract has been awarded yet.

There was to be a planning commission hearing at the city hall October 10 at 10 a.m. on the re-zoning of Lots 4 & 5 in Block 1, and Lot 2 in Block 2 of West Boardman.
