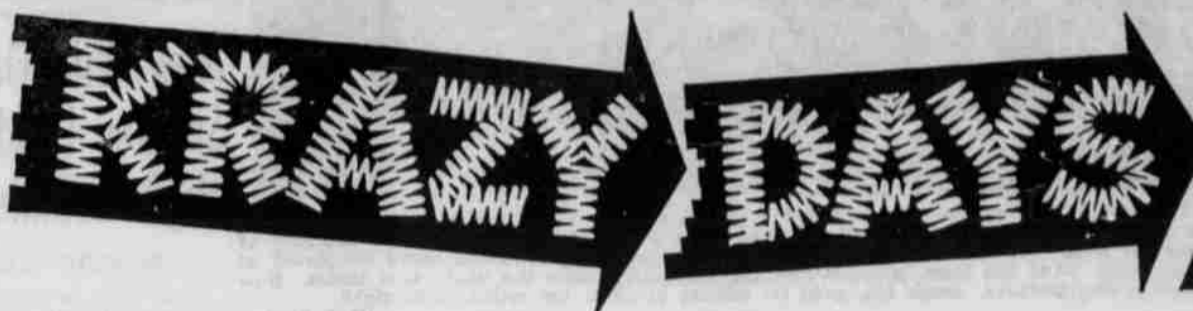
Visiting and hunting with the Don Petersons this week were Mr. and Mrs. Norm Hansen of Beaverton.
