Only the staunchest supporter of Ione High school athletics would have predicted in early September that the Cardinals' football team would be fighting for a district championship by November. The outlook didn't appear very bright at all.

There were only 15 boys out for football—not enough for two 8-man squads. Coach Gordon Meyers at that time spoke in some discouragement about the light turnout.

In first non-counting games, the Cards suffered defeats at the hands of Dufur and Arlington and topped Mt. Vernon. Some unfortunate injuries hampered them, to make the outlook a bit more bleak.

But with the start of the league season, the "never say die" spirit gripped Ione. They won over a good Echo team, followed with victory over Weston, then tripped Umapine. The "big one" loomed with Riverside in a Morrow county "civil war." But by now, the Cards had gained full momentum and rolled over the Pirates by a surprising score.

Typical of the spirit of Ione was the fact that they hoped to meet Arlington once again after being crushed by the Honkers in that early game. They strongly felt that they could take their measure in a second encounter with the experience of a season behind them. But, oddly enough, Arlington is now out of the playoff picture, having been defeated by Dufur.

Their number now reduced by one who left the squad, the "Fighting Fourteen" travels to Prairie City Saturday in the district championship game. Injuries are well healed, spirit is high, and a mighty fine ball team has developed to carry the Morrow county banner to Prairie City.

Ione's Cardinals have made records in sports through their history far above a normal proportion for their size. They have this quality called "heart"—or strong desire—which is one of the most important virtues in athletics. It is an irresistible thing.

The "Fighting Fourteen" will demonstrate this again at Prairie City and the very best wishes of all who appreciate our youth giving their very best effort will go with them.
