Rietmann Elected County President Of Wheat Growers

Wheat farmers elected Bob Rietmann president of the Morrow County Wheat Growers Association at the fall meeting last week. Other officers elected are Lindsay Kincaid, first vice president, Larry Lindsay, second vice president, and Gene Winters, secretary. Outgoing president is Ken Turner.

No stand was taken on pending state tax bill and school funding formula at the meeting. "We want assurance that levies on property tax will not only be reduced more, but that new broadened tax programs will give permanent relief," Turner stated. "Our fear is that the new tax bill may accelerate the already skyrocketing school costs. It simply doesn't give enough relief for now or for future escalation."

It was pointed out that property tax increases averaged 14% in Morrow county this year.

State inheritance laws are old and damaging to the economic growth of the state, the tax committee report said. Small business estates such as farms are burdened by excessive inheritance tax rates. Larry Lindsay was appointed to represent the county association at forthcoming hearings.

Turning to government programs, a committee urged the establishment of a strategic reserve of wheat. Such a reserve would insulate a needed supply from the market and therefore wouldn't depress prices as a so-called surplus does, Turner said.

It was shown that without domestic marketing certificate income, few Morrow county farms would show any profit. Certificates brought nearly two million dollars into the county and made up 29% of the total grain income for 1967.

Wheat farmers also considered the need for a "sensible" land retirement program for conservation and production stability.

The Agri-Business Council of Oregon was commended and given solid support. The Oregon Wheat League's group insurance program for Workmen's Compensation is endorsed and wide member participation urged.

A freight rate survey by the state transportation committee with the county assisting is planned. Rail freight reductions are being sought.

The production and land use committee asked that research funds be restored to higher levels. Better wheat and feed grain varieties adapted to this area are needed. Also more herbicide and plant pathology work is urged.

Bob Rietmann announced plans for an intense membership and dues drive. The program is voluntary, but it is essential that more funds are available for work on legislative matters.

Warnings Given To Dog Owners Of Lethal Bait

OWNERS OF DOGS TAKE NOTICE! This office has just been notified that lethal bait stations are now being placed throughout Morrow county for the control of predatory animals. These measures are being taken in the interest of both livestock and game protection. Warning signs are posted at strategic points along access roads and at the station site itself. Detailed information may be obtained by contacting your trappers, Ralph Burcham at 989-8190 or Gerald Rood at 676-5391.

Roughly speaking, the county trapping is divided by upper Willow Creek to Lexington, north to North Lexington elevator, and across the Bombing Range Road to the Columbia River. Rood is responsible for the area to the east of this line and Burcham's area is west of it. These men need to be notified if you have predator problems, so feel free to call the trapper for your area.
