## CITY OF HEPPNER ORDINANCE NO. 310

It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog of which they are the owner, or have the control thereof, to run at large upon any street, alley or public property within the City of Heppner or to permit the same upon any street or alley within the City unless the same is under the control of some responsible person. Punishable by fine from \$5.00 to \$50.00 or by imprisonment from 2 to 25 days.
