Carol Nistad to Study At Iran University During Travel Abroad

KINZUA—Miss Carol Nistad, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Nistad, left Portland Thursday, January 4, with a group of 25 Lewis and Clark College students who are to have winter and spring term study at the University of Tehran in Iran. The group was accompanied by Dr. Rassekh, chairman of the Lewis and Clark college history department, who is a native of Iran.

After three days in New York, Carol left on January 7, arriving in Iran on Tuesday, January 9 after making stops in Iceland, Luxembourg, Frankfurt, Istanbul, and Beirut. Her first month in Iran will be spent in a home staying with a family in Tehran. Upon moving to the University of 20,000 students, she will rejoin the girls in her group and live in off-campus dormitories provided for women from other Iranian provinces.

At the University, she will continue her studies in "Farsi", the language of Iran, and will study the history of ancient Persia under Dr. Rassekh, besides other courses and her own independent study project.

Tours have been scheduled to the ancient cities of Persepolis and Isfahan, to the oil refinery at Adaban, and to the Caspian Sea. Upon leaving Iran in May, Carol and one of her classmates have permission to leave the group and will tour Turkey, Greece, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Denmark, The Netherlands, Belgium, France, and England on student rates before returning home in August.
