

Umatilla Agent To Teach Lesson On Accessories

Arrangements have been made for extension home economics training in Morrow county, starting with the lesson "Accessories in Your Wardrobe," on Friday, March 1, at the fairgrounds, according to Gene Winters, county extension agent.

Project leaders from the extension units and 4-H clothing and knitting leaders are invited to participate, the agent said. Teaching the lesson will be Mary Speckhart, of the Umatilla County Extension staff, located at Pendleton. Miss Speckhart is a native east Oregonian, having grown up on a farm north of La Grande near Allice. She is a graduate of Oregon State University.

Training scheduled for 4-H home economics club leaders by Miss Speckhart include 4-H clothing leaders' training, March 8, and 4-H foods' leader training, April 10.

Morrow county has been without the services of a County Extension Agent in Home Economics in recent weeks because of reduced state monies available for extension staffing, eliminating the position held by Mrs. Marjorie Wilcoxen.

Planning is underway for other 4-H and adult extension home economics training. The County Extension Home Economics committee will meet with Marie Scales, State Extension Agent, March 7, to plan for the remainder of the program year.

Cost Variances In Production Regulate Return

Cost of agriculture production studies are frequently used for comparison by farm operators when undertaking a "how am I doing" study. Cost and return studies from irrigated farms are examined closely by farmers making the switch to irrigation.

In the Columbia Basin of Washington, extension agents, agriculture economists, and farm management specialists have put together several enterprise data sheets in cooperation with farmers.

One report for fall potato production shows cost of production per ton to vary from \$27 per ton with a 16-ton yield to \$18.19 per ton with a 28-ton yield. When the price received was \$22 per ton the potato grower could come out barely even with a 20-ton per acre yield. At \$20 per ton, more than 23 tons were required to break even in this particular study.

Silage corn, another popular crop in the Columbia basin in Washington, showed production costs per ton to vary from \$6.35 to \$9.95 depending upon yield. When the price of silage corn was \$7 per ton it took about 25 tons production to break even. Sugar beet production studies show when the price is \$12.50 per ton it would take almost 20 tons per acre to break even. Sugar refineries are now paying on basis of sugar content. This has changed the fertilizer application rates appreciably.

When sweet corn yielded 6 tons per acre with a price of \$24 per ton was received, it was estimated in the study the grower was barely receiving the total cost of production.

Most of the studies showed the operator producing average or lower yields was losing money.
