First National's Shareholders Vote Stock Dividend

The annual meeting of First National Bank of Oregon shareholders February 26 was highlighted by approval of the 12 1/2 per cent stock dividend proposed by the bank's board of directors in December. Ralph J. Voss, president, has announced.

The stock dividend, the fourth to be distributed by First National in the past seven years, will be paid on or about April 1 to shareholders of record at the close of business on March 15. Earlier stock dividends consisted of 12 1/2 per cent in 1961, 20 per cent in 1964 and 25 per cent in 1966.

Voss stated there will be no change in the present regular annual dividend rate of \$1.80 per share after payment of the latest stock dividend. The cash dividend on the increased shares therefore will be the equivalent of \$2.02 1/2 per share based on shares currently outstanding.

In other business, shareholders re-elected the board of directors and reviewed the most successful year in the 103-year history of Oregon's leading bank.

Voss noted net operating earnings for 1967 reached a record high for the fifth consecutive year and deposits and loans also climbed to new records. He attributed the gain of almost \$108 million in deposits to an easing of the Federal Reserve Board restrictive policies and the gain of almost \$53 million in loans to the increasing diversification of Oregon's economy.

The board of directors, in its meeting immediately following the meeting of shareholders, approved a cash dividend of \$45 per share payable April 1 to shareholders of record March 14.

Last BLM Tract Reported Sold

Last of the group of 26 tracts in northern Morrow county of-fered for sale by the Bureau of Land Management was reported sold in a story in the Sunday Oregonian recently.

Kenneth R. Pickney of Monterey, Calif., was reported as the buyer of the last tract. All but four tracts were sold at the auction at Boardman on November 24, 1967, and three more were sold January 23.

The final tract, sold to Pickney, is located south of Interstate Highway 80, about two miles from Boardman, and consists of 529 acres. It sold at the appraised price of \$20,000.

Total sale price of 11,865 acres in 26 tracts was \$563,600, or \$47.50 per acre.
