Leland White, 7, Sounds Alarm as Fire Hits Home

Leland White, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom White, is probably responsible for saving his family from their burning home. The youngster woke up about 4:45 a.m. Sunday and choking on smoke, ran into his parents' bedroom to wake them. Tom White said at first he thought the thick smoke was due to a log that had fallen through the fireplace, but some minutes later he recognized the extent of the fire and hurried his wife, four children, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Leland Moe of Portland, from the smoke-filled house.

"The lone Volunteer Fire Department answered the fire call about 5:00 a.m.," said Fire Chief Howard Crowell. Approximately 15 volunteer firemen fought the fire for 2 1/2 hours in intense smoke. The fire had started in a crack in the bottom of the fireplace, spread under the house, moved up between the studs of the walls, and finally into a corner of the attic. Firemen had to tear off part of the outside wall near the fireplace in order to get to the blaze and extinguish it.

Crowell said, "the family was very lucky to have gotten out when they did, and due to the efficiency of the men fighting the fire, the damage was limited to extensive smoke damage to the entire house and the fire damage done to the flooring." An insurance adjuster estimated the damage to be approximately \$2,500.

On Monday evening the Fire Department held a meeting to evaluate the procedure used in the White fire. Crowell told the group that "he felt that volunteers did an excellent job."

Regular meetings of the lone Volunteer Fire Department have been scheduled for the first and third Mondays at 8:00 p.m. each month at the City Hall. Practice in fire fighting and instruction in the operation of equipment is planned for the group. "If we can build up an efficient Fire Department here we can get a better rating from the State Fire Marshal and the State Insurance Rating Bureau. This would enable insurance costs to be lowered in some cases as much as \$50.00," commented Crowell.
