

Visit of Mobile X-Ray Unit Due In County Soon

Services of the Mobile X-Ray Unit of the Oregon State Board of Health will be made available to residents of Morrow county during the week of April 16-19, according to Mrs. Rose Marie Stroeber, president of the Morrow County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The mobile unit is scheduled to be at the new city hall in Boardman on Tuesday, April 16, between 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. It will move on to A. C. Houghton school in Irrigon the same day, between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m.

On Wednesday, April 17, the unit will be at the Chevron service station in Ione, between 2:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. Heppner residents will have services of the unit available on Thursday and Friday, April 18 and 19. It will be in front of Murray's Rexall Drug store from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., and between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 18, and again Friday morning, April 19, between 9:00 a.m. and 12 noon.

All residents of Morrow county are urged to take advantage of this free X-Ray service. Donations to the Christmas TB Seals pays for this service.

Hostesses will be at each location of the Mobile Unit to assist in filling out the cards and help in speedy processing of those who come.

Lexington Firemen Set Regular Meetings

Regular meetings of a volunteer fire fighting unit of the Lexington Fire Department will start Tuesday evening, April 9, at the Lexington City Hall. Meetings will be held regularly on the second Tuesday night of each month at 7:30, and members will be alerted by regular blowing of the city fire siren on these nights.

More volunteers are needed, and the department has issued a call for men to join and help reorganize the department. The town's fire truck is kept in the City hall and taken out regularly on trial runs.

Illness Claims Guy Chapin, 82, Hardman Pioneer

Guy Chapin, a lifetime resident of the Hardman area, died Saturday, March 30, at Pioneer Memorial hospital after being in failing health for several months. He was 82 years of age.

Memorial services were held in the historical and familiar surroundings of the Hardman IOOF hall Monday morning, April 1, at 11:00 a.m. The Rev. Melvin Dixon, minister of the First Methodist church, officiated. The sacred selection, "Lead Kindly Light" was sung by Mrs. Mary Bryant, accompanied by Mrs. Walter Wright at the piano. Interment was in the Hardman IOOF cemetery, with Gus Steers, Huston Lesley, Kenneth Battry, Robert Stevens, Cecil McDaniel and Archie Bechdolt serving as casket bearers.

Guy Chapin was born May 21, 1885, to pioneer Morrow county homesteaders, George and Anna Hoffner Chapin. The homestead ranch on Chapin Creek is now the property of the Chapin Creek Guard Station.

Chapin was a legendary figure in the Hardman community, where he was engaged in ranching and served the area as blacksmith.

His wife, Elva, preceded him in death in 1920.

Surviving him are one son, Leon Chapin of Riley, Ore.; one sister, Mrs. Blanche Jones of Hermiston, and two grandchildren.

The \$8000 to its teacherage fund to use in defraying part of the cost of a teacherage in Ione. The fund will be returned by rentals over a 3-year period.

It was announced that the city planning commission has approved Dale Turner's application for a zoning variance to locate a trailer on a lot that he has purchased. The council had referred this matter to the planning commission at its last meeting.

Street Lights Talked
Possibility of converting some city street lights from the incandescent type to mercury vapor lights was discussed with the report being that 20 lights could be converted at an estimated cost of \$810 in the year's budget. It was agreed that a definite figure should be obtained on costs from Columbia Basin Electric for further consideration.

The new lights would offer considerably more illumination than the present incandescent lights which are located in some parts of town.

Chief of Police Glen Kolkhorst suggested that the city consider a plan of having the police department repair parking meters, a job that is now contracted to Marion Green. The chief said that Bert Corbin, a city officer, would do the work.

A motion to that effect was passed, at the same time authorizing that Green be given 60 days notice, as required by his contract. The chief said that only a small number of meters are not functioning properly now.

Permits Granted
Building permits were granted to Adrian Cook, 580 S. Chase, \$2000, for adding a bedroom, bath and utility room, and to All Saints' Episcopal church, Gale and Church, \$500, for reconstructing concrete steps to the church and parish house.

Club to Sponsor Turkey Shoot, Predator Contest

Morrow County Rifle and Pistol club will sponsor a public Turkey Shoot at the club range, located between Heppner and Lexington, on Sunday, April 7, starting at 10:00 a.m.

There will be matches open for competition, with all types of rifles and pistols eligible in their own group divisions. Anyone who is interested in participating is encouraged to take part.

The Predator Contest is also being sponsored again this year by the club, to be held during the coming months. A point system is again being followed under the following schedule: 200 points, coyotes and bobcats (scalp with ears); 150 points, raccoons and porcupines (coontails, porky noses); 75 points, adult crows and magpies (pair of legs); 25 points, squirrels and starlings (squirrel tails, starling legs); 15 points, non-flying crows and magpies (pair legs); 10 points, eggs from above birds (whole eggs). These may be turned into LenRay Schwarz in Heppner, or to Howard Crowell in Ione.

There will be first and second place prizes, and possibly more, awarded in two age group divisions, 14 years and under and 15 years and over. There will be special prizes awarded to the individuals who turn in the most squirrel tails and coyote scalps, regardless of age group.
