

Wheat Growers Plan Annual Spring Meeting

Farm bargaining power will be one of the main items for discussion at the Morrow County Wheat Growers Association Annual Spring meeting starting at 8:00 p.m., Tuesday, April 23, in the Lexington Grange Hall, according to Bob Rietmann, MCWGA president.

Ray Teal, Oregon State University Extension marketing specialist, working primarily with grains and seeds in international trade, will be the principal speaker.

Restrictions on the use of hired youth labor on farms will be explained by Calvin Fouts of the State Department of Labor at Pendleton.

Bill Hulse, Oregon Wheat Growers League president from Wasco county, will give a short up-to-date report on farm legislation developments.

Rounding out the program will be the announcement and introduction of the 1968 conservation winner of the year and committee reports. Refreshments will follow the meeting at 10:00 p.m., Rietmann concluded.

Need for District Prompts Meeting

Rural residents and land owners in the vicinity of Ione are asked to attend a rural fire control district information meeting Thursday, April 18, at 8:00 p.m. in the Ione City Hall.

A representative from the State Fire Marshal's office will discuss the organization and operation of a rural fire control district. Also present will be fire insurance agency representatives to answer questions about fire insurance.

The meeting has been arranged through the efforts of concerned residents in the Ione community. The Ione city fire equipment is not permitted to fight fires outside the city limits.

There has been a Heppner Rural Fire Control District for several years. The Heppner district has an agreement with the city of Heppner for the operation and maintenance of district fire fighting equipment.

A number of Ione area farmers feel their community may wish to support a similar district to help control and prevent fires.

Program on Meat Scheduled Friday

Interested in stretching your meat dollar? If so, plan to attend the meat buying program co-sponsored by the Umatilla County CowBelles and the Cooperative Extension Service. This program will be held Friday afternoon, April 19, 1:30-3 p.m. at the Vert Auditorium, S. W. 14th and Dorion, Pendleton. Sandra Brookover, consumer meat specialist, Consumer and Marketing Service, United States Department of Agriculture, will give the presentation.

Money-saving tips on selecting, storing, and cooking meat will be covered in Miss Brookover's presentation. Using color-coded slides and cuts of meat, she will illustrate each of the commonly used USDA grades of beef, explaining the degree of tenderness, juiciness, and flavor associated with each grade.

There will be many door prizes, including a half of beef, beef cookbooks, and beef certificates redeemable at local grocery stores. There also will be free USDA and Oregon State University bulletins on meat selection and meat cookery.

Molly Saul Invites Leaders to Session

Marie Tribble, food and nutrition specialist, Oregon State University, will be in Umatilla county April 25 and 26 to teach a lesson entitled "Getting the Most From Beef". Home Agent Molly Saul invites all home extension units and organized women's groups in Umatilla and Morrow counties to send project leaders to take this training lesson. For 4-H club foods leaders in both counties are also invited. These leaders will later present the lesson to their groups.

This lesson will help homemakers gain more satisfaction from beef served for family meals. It will also help them learn how to identify cuts of beef according to tenderness. Miss Tribble will help the leaders learn how to match the correct method of cookery to the cut of beef being prepared. She will also help those who take the lesson become better able to determine the best beef buy for the money expended.

This lesson is the first in a two-part series. The follow-up lesson will be included in Umatilla and Morrow County Home Extension programs next year.

Miss Tribble will present the lesson Thursday, April 25, at 10 a.m. at the Christian Church, Milton-Freewater. The same lesson will be taught Friday, April 26, at the Christian Church in Pendleton, starting at 10 a.m. Coffee will be served both days at 9:30 a.m. with advisory committee members, Mrs. Milton Biegel and Mrs. Richard Meier, serving as hostesses.
