Hearing Slated To Study Rules On Brucellosis

The State Department of Agriculture recently announced a hearing to be held Wednesday, May 15, 1968, starting at 1:00 p.m. in the Deschutes County Courthouse Annex in Bend.

The purpose of this hearing will be to receive evidence and testimony on a proposal by the department to revise paragraph (5) Section 11-525, Chapter 603, Oregon Administrative Rules. The present paragraph reads:

"Beef and dairy calves may be vaccinated only between the ages of three to eleven months (inclusive) of age until April 30, 1968, on and after May 1, 1968, beef and dairy calves may only be vaccinated between the ages of three and eight months (inclusive) of age. Vaccination of adult cattle is prohibited."

The department proposes that above mentioned Oregon Administrative Rules be revised to read that dairy calves may be vaccinated for brucellosis only between the ages of three and eight months of age (inclusive) and that beef calves may be vaccinated for brucellosis only between the ages of three and ten months of age (inclusive).

Any person desiring to submit facts or data, orally or in writing, may do so by appearing at the hearing or by writing or contacting the Veterinary Division, State Department of Agriculture, Salem, Oregon.

Notice hereby is given that at the City of Boardman serial levy election hereby called to be held on Tuesday, the 28th day of May, 1968, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 8:00 o'clock P.M., Pacific Daylight Time, in and for the City of Boardman, Oregon, there will be submitted to the qualified voters thereof the question of establishing a serial levy in the sum of \$3,500.00 per year for ten years, for a total amount of \$35,000.00 over the ten year period for the purpose of financing the cost of the purchase of additional fire fighting apparatus and equipment. The vote shall be by ballot, which ballot title shall be in substantially the following form:

"QUESTION SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE CITY OF BOARDMAN, OF MORROW COUNTY, OREGON. Measure authorizing a continuing special serial tax levy in excess of the limitations of Section 11, Article XI of the Constitution of Oregon.

"The City Council of Boardman, Oregon certify and state that a special continuing serial levy is necessary to provide funds for financing the acquisition and construction of the additional fire fighting apparatus and equipment to provide proper fire protection for the City of Boardman."

The election is to be held in the City of Boardman, Oregon, at the Boardman Grange Hall. The polls shall be open at the hour of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and remain open until the hour of 8:00 P.M. of the same day, at which hour the polls will be closed.

Notice hereby is given that at the City of Boardman tax base election hereby called to be held on Tuesday, the 28th day of May, 1968, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 8:00 o'clock P.M., Pacific Daylight Time, in and for the City of Boardman, Oregon, there will be submitted to the qualified voters thereof the question of establishing a new tax base for the City of Boardman in the sum of \$10,000.00, pursuant to Section 11, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution, to be effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1968. The votes

shall be by ballot in substantially the following form:

"MEASURE SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE CITY OF BOARDMAN, OREGON

"MEASURE
"Shall the City of Boardman, Oregon be authorized to establish a new tax base in the amount of TEN THOUSAND and NO/100 DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) pursuant to Section 11, Article XI, of the Oregon Constitution, to be effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1968?"

"The present tax base is \$2815. The total amount of money to be raised by the new tax base is the sum of TEN THOUSAND and NO/100 DOLLARS (\$10,000.00). In order to raise this amount of proposed tax base levy it will be necessary to levy a tax in the amount of \$4.82 per one thousand dollars of true cash value of property in the City. The voter shall place an (X) or a (✓) before the words 'YES, I vote for the tax base levy' or before the words 'NO, I vote against the tax base levy' to signify his choice."

The election is to be held in the City of Boardman, Oregon, at the Boardman Grange Hall. The polls shall be open at the hour of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and remain open until the hour of

8:00 P.M. of the same day, at which hour the polls will be closed.
