

Proper Timing Important In Controlling of Weeds

Proper timing with the application of new herbicides in winter wheat gave good weed control this year in the Columbia Basin counties.

Field size applications showed the value of Linuron (Lorox), Bromoxynil (Brominal, Buc-tril) and the mixture of bromoxynil and MCPA (Bromate) when applied according to labeled directions.

A tour of wheat fields in the region by Rex Warren, extension farm crops specialist, and Arnold Appleby, Farm Crops Department, both Oregon State University, with industry representatives, applicators and county agents in April, showed the importance of timing.

In general, good weed control was observed from Lorox applied in December and January, Bromoxynil applied during the same period gave good results. Applications of the bromoxynil-MCPA in late February and March gave good control. Bromoxynil must be applied when the weeds are small. The mixture should be applied when the wheat has reached 5 or more leaf stage and while the weeds are small in the seedling stage.

Morrow county wheat growers experiencing poor weed control with 2,4-D should investigate the new materials in the next year's crop. It is recommended that small acreages be treated at first.

Poor Results Expected In Sagebrush Spraying

Timing of sagebrush spraying is always important, but it is particularly critical in a year of limited moisture like this one.

A shortage of soil moisture means a shorter period when an effective kill of sagebrush can be expected. Spraying should be done when the big sagebrush is growing rapidly.

Most of the sagebrush observed in the county is growing quite slowly. Poor results would be expected from sagebrush spraying this year.

Knapweed Needs Treating In Early Breed Stage

The two knapweeds giving the most trouble in Morrow county are rapidly reaching the most susceptible stages for treating.

Diffused knapweed, primarily a range weed, should be sprayed with 2,4-D, diamba (Banvel) in the bud stage. Russian knapweed, a taller growing, more heavily rooted species found more in cropland and bottom lands, should be

treated in the early bud stage. This perennial can be controlled with 2,4-D, diamba (Banvel D), Picloran (Tordon), sodium chlorate and borate type sterilants. The material to use depends upon extent of infestation, whether land is to be cropped or grazed, and closeness to other crop plants. Herbicide dealers, applicators or county extension agents, can help farmers select proper material.

Sprinkler Intake Rates Vary With Soil Types

Sprinkler irrigation intake rates are frequently judged incorrectly in the design of sprinkler irrigation systems. Intake rate is a primary concern when considering sprinkler numbers, size and spacing. With the introduction of some self-propelled systems, the ability of soil to take water is critical.

Recently sprinkler intake rate tests were made in Morrow county and in a number of fields close by in adjacent counties. On soils typical of much of the county wheat growing area north of Lexington intake rates were found to be about 0.25 inches per hour. On Ritzville soils similar to that tested the recommended maximum design rates by Marvin Shearer, Extension Irrigation Specialist, is 0.25 to 0.28 inches per hour. On Sage-moor soils (found in the northerly belt of the wheat growing area in the county) the design should not exceed 0.23 inches per hour.

It was found that with Ephra-tan or loamy sand soils in north Morrow county the design rates could be 2.0 inches per hour.

Condemnations Run One in 394

One in every 394 animals checked by Oregon Department of Agriculture meat inspectors was rejected during the first three months of 1968. During the same period a year ago, one in every 417.2 was condemned.

The total slaughter figure for plants under state inspection for the first quarter of 1968 was 88,269 animals compared with 88,453 animals in 1967.

For the period of January through March of this year inspectors also rejected 30,168 parts having a total weight of 177,304 pounds. Livers accounted for 26,261 of the parts with their total poundage 157,856.

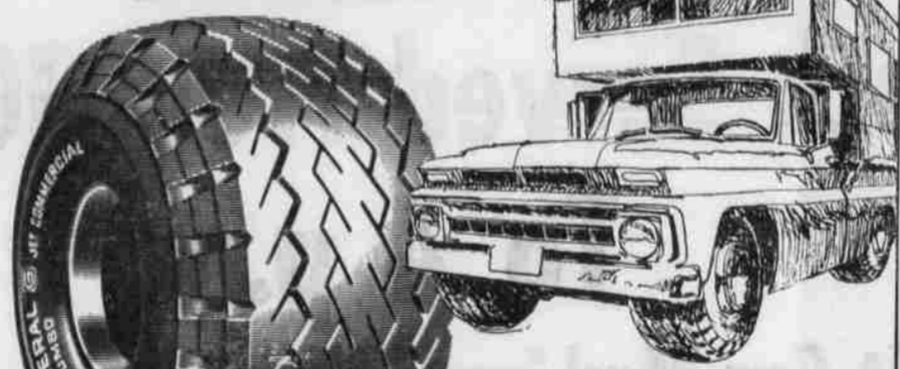
