**Dr. Rempel Speaks For Measure No. 3**

Measure No. 3 which will be on the nonpartisan ballot at the primary election on May 28, combines a "pay as you go" plan with a "pay as you grow" plan for higher education and community college buildings in Oregon. Dr. A. M. Rempel, president of Eastern Oregon College, La Grande, told members of the Heppner-Morrow county Chamber of Commerce May 13.

With the use of slides and other visual aids, Dr. Rempel, assisted by Dr. Lloyd O'Connor, also of EOC, told of the building needs in higher education within the next few years, and said that Measure No. 3, which would permit the state to finance new higher educational developments by bonding, would answer this need.

The state traditionally has been on a "pay as you go" basis for college buildings. Under the terms of Measure No. 3, however, the bonding limit would be increased from \$30 million for this purpose to \$115 million. The bonding limit would be fixed at 3/4 of 1% of the true cash value of taxable property in the state.

**Matching Provided**  
Also provided in the measure is that the state would match every dollar bonded by another dollar from the general fund. Thus, future generations—those who receive the benefits from education and the buildings—would help pay for the buildings together with those currently paying into the state's general fund, he explained.

It was only in 1964 that voters in the state approved a measure that "opened the door" to bonding for higher educational buildings. This provided \$30 million for the purpose. Morrow county voters were fourth from the top among counties of the state in percentage of affirmative vote on the measure.

Approval of the bonding measure will require no new taxes nor increase in taxes, the president said.

However, he added, "I would be less than honest if I said this would have no effect on your pocketbook," pointing out that the bonds would be retired from the state's general fund in the future.

If it is determined that the needed college buildings are to be constructed, the bond measure will provide a more painless way of paying for them and will not be so great a burden on taxation at the present time, he said.

**Enrollment Increase Told**

Dr. Rempel spoke of the rapidly accelerating college enrollments. Community college enrollments will double within the next 10 years, he said. In the same period, higher education institutions will increase in enrollment by some 40%.

"What are you going to do with all these people?" he asked.

The college president told of "desperate" needs in college buildings. First that would be constructed would be a forestry building at Oregon State University, a science building at Portland State and a law building at the University of Oregon.

He spoke of the dire need for expansion of the physical education plant at Eastern Oregon College, and the need for a new student center there.

Enrollment at EOC has doubled in 10 years, reaching 1518 last fall. At Southern Oregon College in Ashland enrollment has tripled in the same period.

"A no vote on this measure would mean that no money would be available for higher education and community college buildings," Dr. Rempel said.

Now attending the state's higher education institutions are 44,000 students, and there

are 14,000 in community colleges. Projected figures show that by 1974-75 the higher education institutions will have 58,330 and the community colleges 34,111.

**County Sends 94**

At the present time 94 students from Morrow county are

attending higher education schools in the state, and community colleges are not included. Thirty-five attend EOC, 30 attend Oregon State University and 23 University of Oregon.

The speaker said that proponents of the measure are think-

ing in terms only of very basic needs in building and plan no frills nor luxuries. As in the past, the state legislature will continue to authorize buildings giving them full control, although the State Board of Higher Education will make recommendations to the legislature.

Dr. Rempel said that this was his first visit to Heppner, told of the success of Parents Week-end at the college last week, and mentioned the fine relationship existing between Blue Mountain College and EOC.

"I consider Dr. Wally McCrea, president of Blue Mountain, as an outstanding educational leader and a man of great vision," he said.

Jerry Sweeney, Morrow county chairman of Colleges for Oregon's Future, introduced Dr. Rempel and Dr. O'Connor.

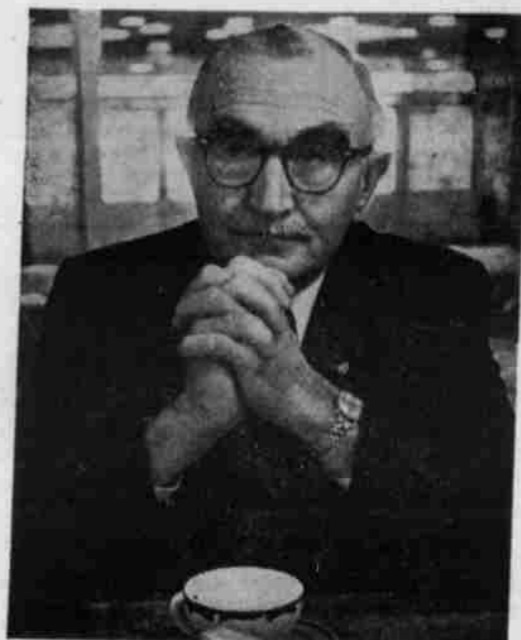

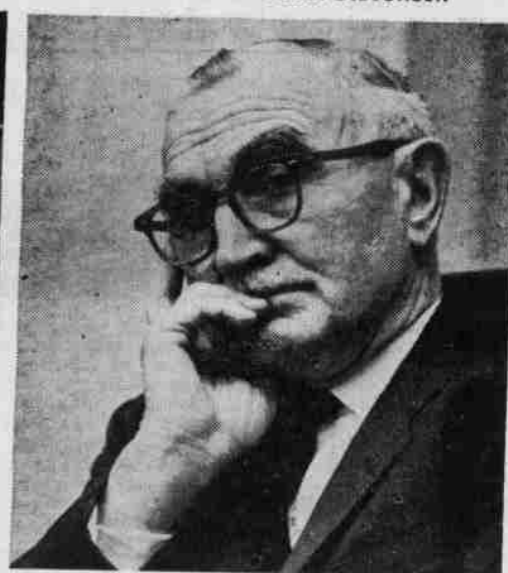
