Herbert Andrew Case, 54, of Poulso, Wn., and formerly of Heppner, died unexpectedly last Wednesday afternoon after he suffered a heart attack while leaving work at the naval shipyard in Bremerton.

Funeral services were Monday, June 3, at St. Charles Episcopal church in Poulso, and interment was in Woodlawn Memorial Park, Bremerton. Case had lived in Poulso for the past eight years. Prior to that he had been a carpenter in Heppner for years.

He suffered the attack as he was leaving his shift at the shipyards and had not reached his car. He was taken to a fire station for emergency treatment but failed to survive the attack.
