

Linda Clough Wins First in Olympics

Linda Clough, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Clough, tied for first place in the standing long jump for girls 12-13 in the AAU Junior Olympics in Portland Saturday. Her leap of 7'10" tied her for first with a girl from Portland, and this qualifies her to continue towards the nationals at another meet to be held probably in Portland, later this summer.

For her achievement, Linda, an eighth grader in Heppner Elementary school, received a gold medal and a certificate. She was the only one from Heppner to enter the meet, having qualified for the Junior Olympics in the local contest held recently at Arlington. The meet was held in Arlington this year because of work being done at the rodeo grounds field in Heppner.

Patti Pettyjohn Wins Barrel Racing Title

Patti Pettyjohn, a student at Blue Mountain Community College and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Pettyjohn of Ione, is scheduled to compete in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo at Sacramento, Calif., on July 2-7.

She is a member of the BMCC Rodeo Club, coached by Bill Fraser, which has 60 members. Members recently competed in events at Weber State College in Ogden, Utah.

As a result of points gained in this and other barrel racing events through the year, Patti has won the Rocky Mountain region intercollegiate barrel racing title, and is eligible for the national event.

The Racing Form said that the event was named in honor of the Heppner man, in recognition of the fact that he has been "Sheepman, wheat rancher, horse trainer, son of an Oregon pioneer family, businessman and philanthropist, Heppner's 'Grand Old Man.'"

Accompanied by a large gathering of family and friends, he was on the lower judges stand during the running of the eighth race. Turner presented a blanket with his name inscribed on it to the winning horse of the race but could not remember its name because of the excitement.

In the ninth race, "Twinson," owned and entered by Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm R. McKenzie, came in second. Mrs. McKenzie is a granddaughter of Turner.

An announcement in the Portland Meadows racing program for the day also proclaimed, "Frank W. Turner of Heppner, Oregon, Horseman, Sportsman, Citizen, Humanitarian."
