THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that the findings and determinations of the Oregon State Game Commission adopted at the stated meeting of said Commission on November 3 and 16, 1967, respectively, hereby are modified as follows:

That the season is closed to angling for salmon and jack salmon in that portion of the Columbia River from the Astoria-Megler Bridge to Bonneville Dam from 12:01 a.m. May 27, 1968 to 12:01 a.m. June 22, 1968; and in that portion of Columbia River from Bonneville Dam to the Oregon - Washington state line from 12:01 a.m. May 27, 1968, to 12:01 a.m. May 27, 1968.
