Rains and Cool Weather Boost Grain Outlook

Drouth conditions in eastern Oregon were relieved somewhat in May with widespread shower in May with widespread shower activity and cool temperatures, according to the Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Prospective 1968 winter wheat production is estimated at 30,485,000 bushels, 1½ percent larger than the 1967 crop but about 14 million bushels below the 1/2 million bushels below the May 1 production forecast. Additional moisture is needed,

wever, in the summer-fallow counties in eastern Oregon, par-ticularly on stands located on shallow soils. Rains came too late to save some stands. Lack of tillering is also a common problem in eastern Oregon. The rains have been very beneficial to the western Oregon winter wheat with little rust infestation being reported. The June 1 forecast is based

on farmer reports of wheat con-dition the first of the month. Al-so, some Oregon wheat fields have been selected for plots in which actual plant counts are made and development is measured to help forecast yield.

In the Pacific Northwest (Oregon, Washington, and northern Idaho) the winter wheat crop is forecast at 146 million bushels, compared with 161 million bushels in 1967 and the May 1 forecast of 156 million bushels, Pre-cipitation and cool temperatures during May aided the winter wheat development and prevent-

ed further deterioration.

The U. S. winter wheat crop is estimated at 1,230 million bushels, compared with 1,212 million bushels in 1967, and the May 1 forecast of 1,194 million bushels.
