Divisions in the halter classes will be for mares of all ages, geldings of all ages and stallions of all ages.

The six other classes will include Western pleasure, bit reining, pole bending, barrel racing, hackamore reining and Western riding.

The first Tune-up Day was held in Hermiston, and the next one is set for September 8 in Pendleton.
