

Impressions of U. N. Tour Told in Letter From Area Delegate

Michael Davidson of Hermiston, who was the representative of Morrow, Umatilla, Wallowa and Union counties on the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth tour this summer, has reported by letter to Mrs. Altha Kirk of Hermiston of highlighting experiences of his trip.

The tour is sponsored annually by Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges over the state, with winner of the area speech contests in March given the privilege to make the tour. Mrs. Kirk is a state committee member on this project.

Excerpts of the letter written by Michael, while on the tour, follow:

"We have now completed the main objective of our United Nations Pilgrimage. There were excitements, disappointments, and all around fun in New York City. The privilege of studying the United Nations and meeting representatives from countries such as the U. S., Iran, and Australia will never be forgotten as long as I live!

"We arrived in New York on Sunday, July 21, around 4:00 in the afternoon. The delegates were arranged in groups so that there were two from the East coast and two from the West coast. There were 13 states represented at this, Montana, Saskatchewan, North Dakota, Alberta, Washington, British Columbia, Oregon, Idaho, Utah, New York, New Jersey and Delaware. I roomed with another member of our bus tour and two boys from New York state. The exchange of ideas between two parts of the country was really great.

"The following day was mostly made up of generalized U. N. briefings. We had lunch in the Delegates' Dining room, which is only for dignitaries. That afternoon we saw Riverside church, Grant's Tomb and the International House.

"We had on the average, four briefings a day. To name a few were UNICEF, UNESCO, FAO, Interpretation in the U. N., and population growth. Representatives from the countries of Russia, Pakistan and Nigeria gave us briefings on their countries.

"We saw many of the famous sights of New York, including Greenwich Village, the Empire State Building, a boat trip around Manhattan Island. Our cultural background was expanded by plays and musical arts.

"It was a sentimental moment when we all departed from the Atlantic-Sheraton on Saturday, the 27th. The short week had been indelibly printed upon the hearts of everyone present.

"We will spend a night at Montpelier, Vermont, and then enter Canada, and then be on our way home."

It is customary that the tour delegate will visit and report to sponsoring lodges in the area at a special meeting in the fall. Scheduled time of his visit here with Willows IOOF and Sans Souci Rebekah lodges will be announced later.

Of interest to some Morrow county residents is the fact that Michael is a grandson of the late William O'Rourke who lived here as a young man, and the grandmother still resides in Pendleton. Michael is the son of their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas P. Davidson, who manage the Umatilla Experiment Station in Hermiston.

A native of Kansas, she received her B. A. degree from Kansas City University in 1927. Later she earned her M. A. degree from Colorado State College at Greeley, Colo. Also, in recent years, she has attended Oregon University at Eugene and Oregon State University at Corvallis. She was married to Frank Coy during her early college years.

Mrs. Coy has had a various life of teaching. She taught 3rd and 4th grades in Kansas State School for the Blind. She also taught in a private school near Glendale, Ariz. In recalling this, she remembered one boy, Paul Miller, who was in the 2nd grade at that time. He is now a missionary near Durban, South Africa. Many other young people have gone on to notable careers.

Mr. and Mrs. Coy built a beautiful home, with picture windows overlooking the Columbia River, several years ago. Oregon TB Deaths Total 37 in 1967, Association Hears

Tuberculosis deaths in Oregon in 1967 totaled 37, and there were 322 new cases as well as 92 reactivated cases of TB, Franklin Patterson of Baker, chairman of the Eastern Region Council of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association, reported at a meeting of the council held recently in Baker.

He said that 50% of the new TB cases in Oregon are in an advanced stage when first discovered, as compared with 75% nationally when first found.

Patterson presided at the session. Directors from Morrow county on the council are Mrs. Marcel (Doe) Jones and Mrs. Rose Marie Stroeber, both of Heppner. Mrs. Stroeber is presently serving as president of the Morrow county council and Mrs. Jones is representative director to the state board of directors of OTHA.

John J. Mohr, M. D., of Baker, gave a talk during the morning session on the current status of tuberculosis.

"Even though great progress has been and continues to be made," he said, "it is unlikely that tuberculosis will ever be totally eradicated."

His talk covered the nature of the disease, treatment and prevention.

Dallas Pierson, health education director, OTHA, showed a new film, entitled "Spirometry," which was financed by the association. The script was written by James Morris, M. D., under the auspices of the Oregon Thoracic Society. Dr. Morris is chief of the pulmonary and infectious disease section, Veterans Administration Hospital, Portland.

The 30-minute color film is available for physicians, medical groups and those in a position to assist in early detection of breathing difficulties.

Anthony F. Haberlach, program director for the Eastern Region, stated that 11,525 small chest X-rays were provided by the mobile unit within the six eastern region counties between February 5 and May 23, 1968. In Morrow county, X-rays provided in April were as follows: Boardman, 103; Irrigon, 56; Ione, 115; Heppner, 451.

Patterson announced that next meeting of the council is planned tentatively for Pendleton at which time "Chest Clinics," conducted jointly by the Oregon State Board of Health TB Control Section and the county health department, will be
