### Church Pays Honor To Mrs. Bartholomew On 94th Birthday

One of the county's eldest, yet happiest, pioneer residents was honored on her 94th birthday on Sunday, August 4.

Mrs. Charles (Phebe) Bartholomew observed her anniversary among friends at the Echo Methodist church, when a special coffee hour reception was held in her honor following the morning services. She was presented a pink corsage, and a decorated birthday cake was served her many guests.

Except for a few months, Mrs. Bartholomew has lived all of her 94 happy years on Butter Creek. She was born August 4, 1874, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Thomson, early Butter Creek homesteaders. After graduating from Monmouth Normal school in 1895 with a life certificate, she taught one year in the Thomson school and two years at Pine City before her marriage to Charles Bartholomew in 1901.

Since Mr. Bartholomew's death, she has made her home with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Jasper Myers, on the home place.

She has seen many developments in the Butter Creek and surrounding areas since her childhood days on the ranch. She can recall many experiences with the Indians and can recall going with her family on the boat to The Dalles from Umatilla during the Indian scare in 1878. Phebe's mother was Susan Atwood, who crossed the plains with her parents when she was three years old.

Mrs. Bartholomew loves to travel, and often visits her son, O. F. Bartholomew in Salt Lake City, Utah. She has grandchildren and their families in Canada and Alaska that she hopes to visit.

Besides her son in Utah, she has three daughters, Mrs. Truman (Mary) Sether, Seattle; Mrs. Marion (Fay) Finch, Hermiston, and Mrs. Jasper (Lila) Myers, Pine City. Also, nine grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren, all devoted admirers of "grandmother".

### 3 Unique Paintings Placed on Display At Local Museum

A group of three unique paintings will be on display at the Morrow County Museum during the coming fair and rodeo week, and the public is invited to see them.

These paintings by Ed Clark of Hermiston are unique for a variety of reasons.

First, they are painted with dye on home tanned rawhides. They relate to three historical areas of this part of the state—"Wells Springs, 1847"; "Ranch at Willow Creek, 1862"; and "North Fork of the John Day River, 1880".

Clark is a grandson of Oscar Clark, early pioneer on the Old Oregon Trail who served with Col. Gilliam, and relates in painting, his grandfather and family camping at Wells Springs and making friends with the Indians. The grandfather and family settled on Willow Creek springs, proceeded to build a dugout in the face of the hill, and in two years had built a house atop the dugout, built in army block method. They were visited by Indians and their squaws, and their son, Edward, was the first white child born on the first ranch on Willow Creek. These are among things shown in the paintings.

Complete histories of the people and events seen in the paintings have been written by Clark, the artist. He has been working on the paintings since 1960. He is the son of Hiram Clark, an early pioneer.
