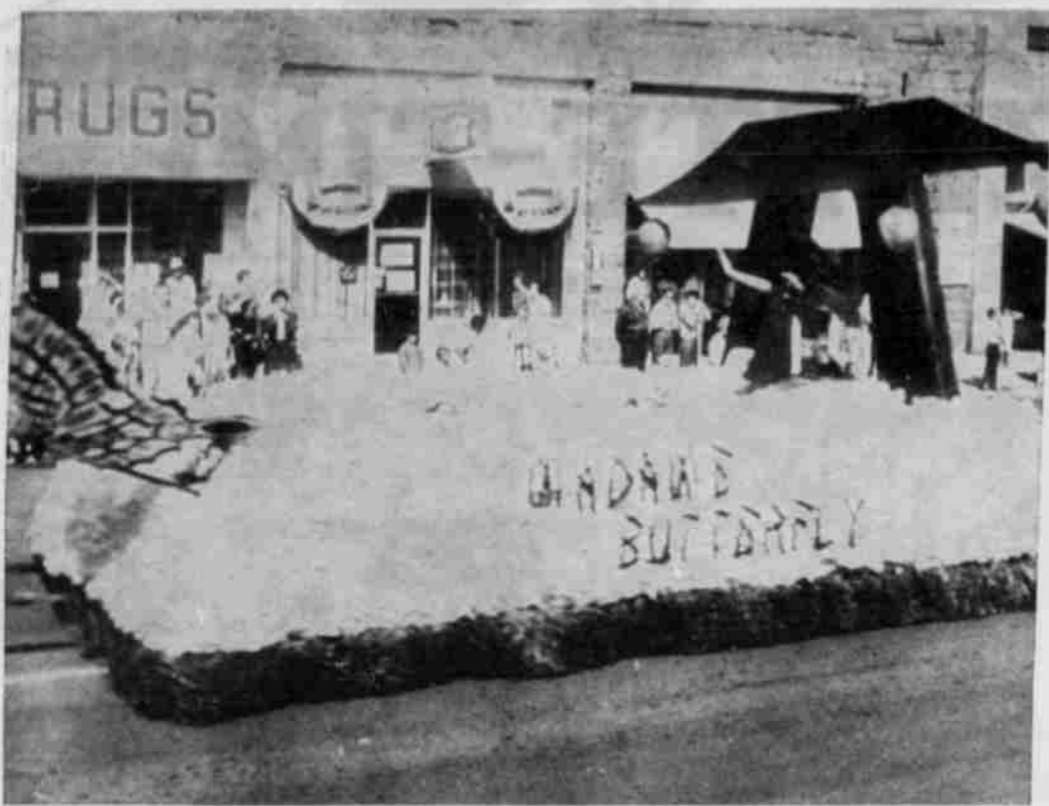


# Many Beautiful Floats Seen in Parade



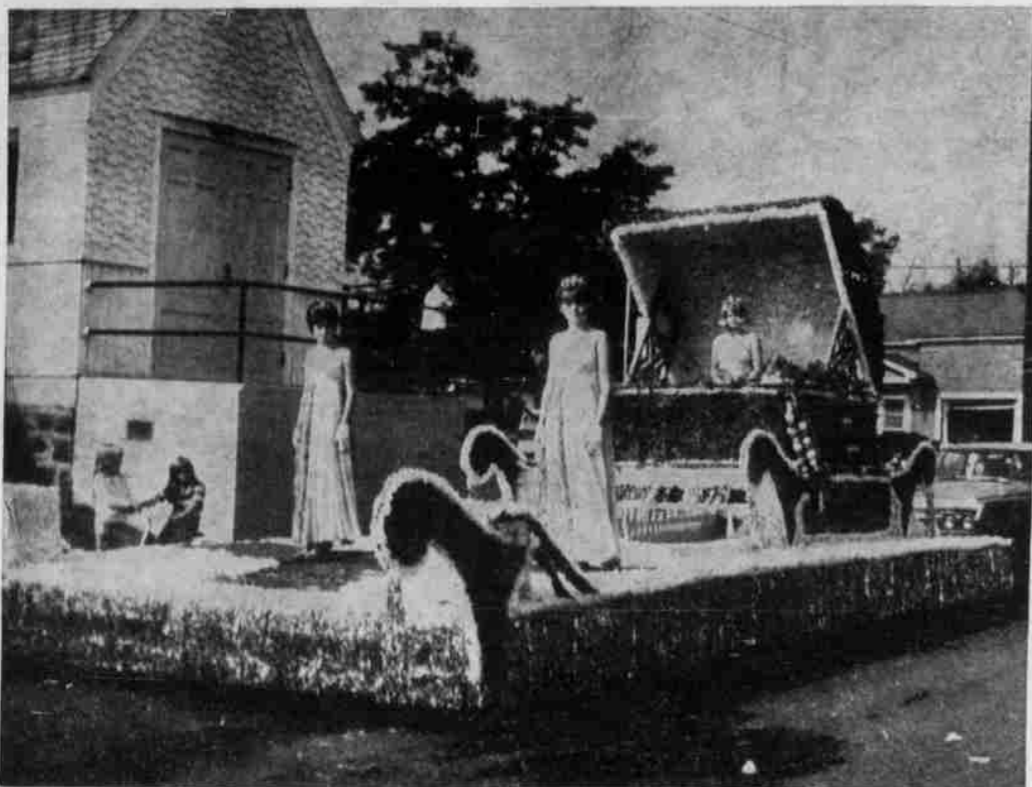
## Fine Entries ...

... marked the 1968 rodeo parade here Saturday as rains held off for a cool, pleasant day.

The Soroptimist float, "Madame Butterfly," was meticulously done and won second place in the adult float division (top left).

Harold Erwin, old-time rodeo hand and long time supporter of the Morrow county rodeo, was grand marshal of the parade (top center).

The old 1906 Sears and Roebuck car entered by Mr. and Mrs. Harold (Shorty) Peck brought "ohs" and "aahs" from the big rodeo crowds. It purred right along the parade route, hard rubber tires and all. (Top right).

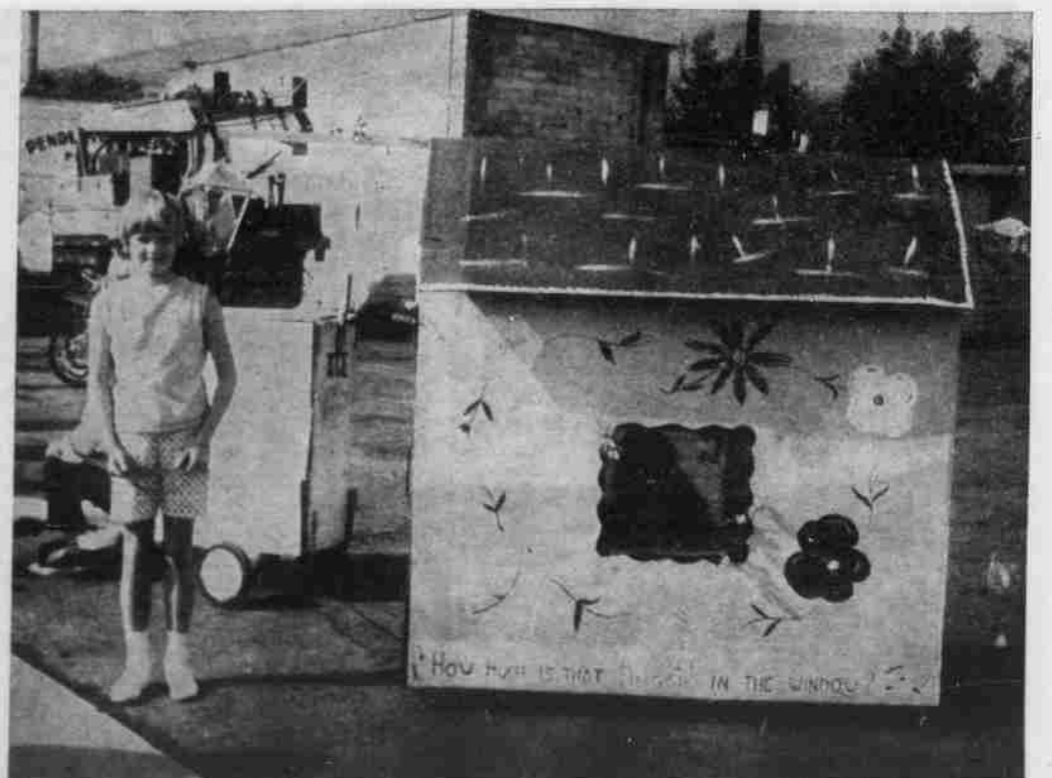
