Bill and Greg Greenup showed the champion and reserve champion lambs; David and Robert Richards showed the champion and reserve champion swine; and Kyle and Kirk Robinson showed the champion and reserve champion steers.

Many awards were presented to the 4-H and FFA winners prior to the pig scramble and livestock auction last Thursday night.

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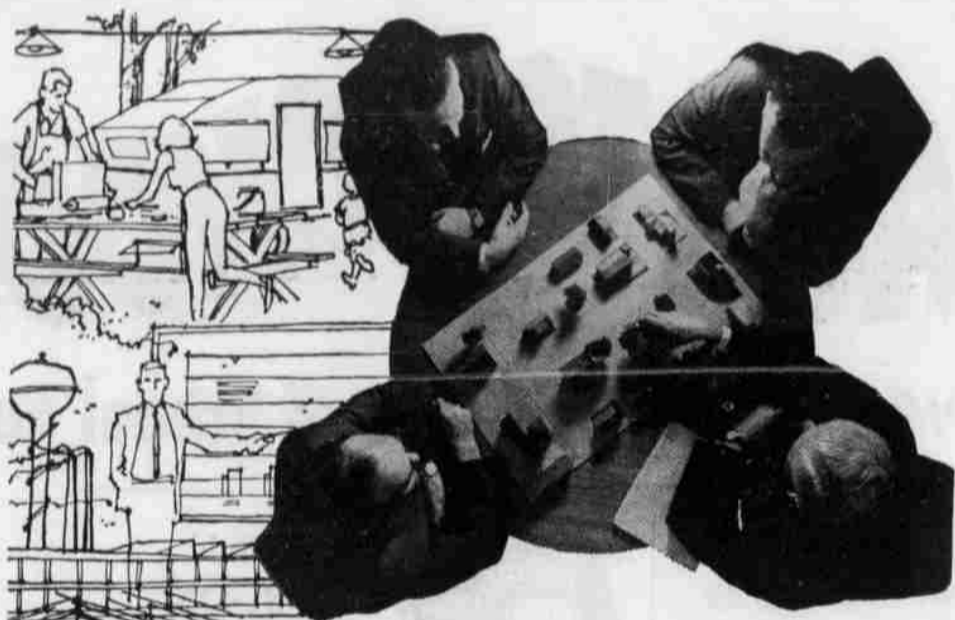
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
