IRRIGON — The Irrigon 4-H Community Club was well represented at the Morrow County Fair this year. The members came home with trophies, championships and blue ribbons in every division in which they entered.

"Skip" Grochowski received grand championship on his no-bake cookies in the Outdoor Cooking club division. These went to the State Fair, as did a butter cake on which Kelli Snyder won grand championship. Chris Snyder won 2nd place on his cookies in the Outdoor Cooking Club.

Judy Snyder placed second on her whiteface calf and second on her ram. Last year Judy Snyder caught a pig in the pig scramble, from which she raised nine piglets. One of these was returned for the pig scramble this year, which is one of the fair rules. Tim Rice and Robert Richards were the Irrigon boys successful in the pig scramble this year and will return a piglet each next year, keeping the rest of the litter.

The Richards family brought home three trophies—Robert, Jr. received one in junior showmanship with swine, Karen received grand champion in junior showmanship with sheep and David, intermediate showmanship with swine. She took champion on her Guernsey cow and reserve champion in dairy showmanship. David had champion market hog, 1st prize in his Guernsey cow, and 1st in dairy showmanship. In sheep, 1st on market lamb, champion ram, 1st on yearling sheep, and 2nd on breeding Montadale flock.

Peggy Brandt won champion on a breeding lamb and placed 2nd in showmanship, she received reserve champion on her Home Ec measuring demonstration.

Dannette Leighton received grand champion in junior division modeling, 2nd in 4-H sewing and 1st on sewing in the children's corner.

Carol Wiley placed 1st in her 4-H cake baking demonstration and 2nd in intermediate cake baking contest. She and her sister, Frances, both received 2nd on their nut bread.

## County Association Opposed to Measure

The Executive Committee of the Association of Oregon Counties has unanimously agreed to oppose the 1 1/2 per cent property tax limitation measure which will appear on the November 5, 1968 general election ballot.

Deschutes County Commissioner Gerald W. McCann, AOC president, said that the association's governing body consider an irresponsible alternative to the property tax problems of Oregon's homeowners.

He pointed out that the AOC is currently working with the League of Oregon Cities and the Oregon School Boards Association to develop a reasonable program of tax relief for the homeowner.

"Although individual homeowners would realize limited property tax relief from the proposed measure, private corporations, private individuals and others with large land holdings will reap the major dollar benefits," McCann added.

## National Forest Receipts Allotted

Oregon and Washington counties with National Forest lands will receive a record \$31.4 million as their share of receipts from National Forest earnings in fiscal year 1968.

Regional Forester Charles A. Connaughton said the total is \$5 million greater than last year's allocation to the counties in the Forest Service's Pacific Northwest Region.

The payments being mailed to treasurers of the two states represent 25 per cent of the receipts from all resources and uses of the National Forests, including timber harvest, grazing, minerals, recreation, power, and other land use.

Shares are proportioned according to National Forest acreage, with counties using the

money for public roads and schools.

This year's total—\$31,408,817.95—will be divided with 30 Oregon counties receiving \$22,554,293.29, compared with \$18,806,579.63 last year, while 27 Washington counties will receive \$8,854,522.66, compared with \$7,516,284.92 a year ago.

Morrow county will receive \$4,011.63 and Wheeler \$81,713.15.

Lane County continued to receive the biggest share in Oregon, at \$5 million, while Shastana County was high in Washington, with \$2.5 million.

Oregon counties since 1966 have received a total of \$225 million, while Washington counties have been allocated \$95 million as their share of National Forest earnings.



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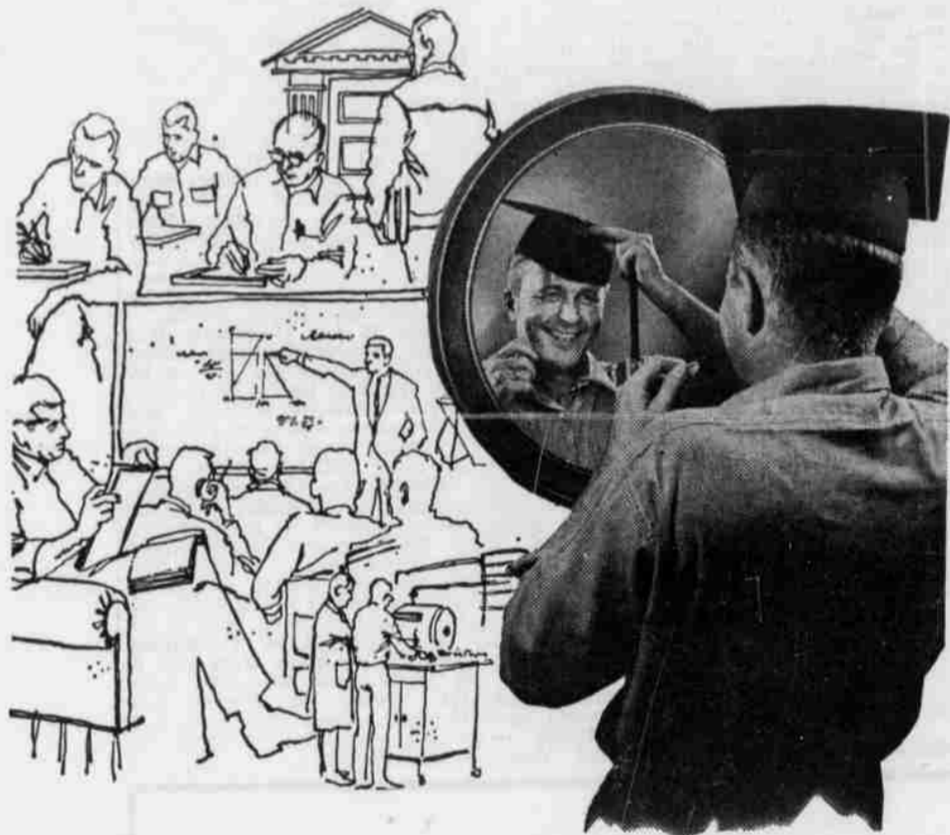
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
